**ARRANGE BIG PROGRAM**

Elaborate Banquet, Served Army Style, Will Be Provided Free of Charge to All Ex-Service Men Noon of That Day.

The ex-service men of Douglas county are to enjoy a rare treat at the hands of the American Legion boys, according to the plans of the committee in charge of the Armistice Day celebration. It is the purpose of this committee to recall to the minds of all ex-service men all of the pleasant things experienced in service; also to remind each man of the comedy unseen in the things that were not pleasant. Perhaps the most welcome "call" any uniformed man has ever heard was "mess call." That was the time when military stiffness was forgotten, when rank meant nothing, when for the short period of one hour one could relax and forget the grind of war hardships. Every ex-service man in Douglas county who cares to partake of the treat is cordially invited by the American Legion boys to visit Roseburg on November 11th next, where a monster "mess line" will be formed and real food served "army style." You all know what that means. Looking back over the Armistice Day celebration last year, and realizing that the local Legion boys always make good when they promise a treat; there is no doubt that this big free dinner to all ex-service men who will come and partake of it will measure up to the promises of the committee arranging it.
