"Yes," I interrupted eagerly, "and if you can I want Walter Jones to clear Sheila from that terrible court sentence that was passed upon her."

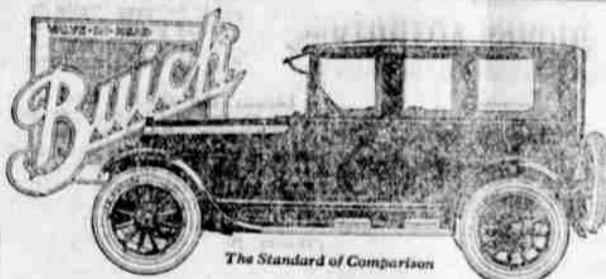
The chief of police looked at me rather quizzically.
