COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 23.—"Much criticism is being aimed at colleges because so many students are taking courses for which they are not fitted," declared Dr. W. O. Thompson, president of the Ohio State University.

(International News Service.) CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—There's little use of dying in Chicago to escape old H. C. L., according to Alderman John C. Cahill.

"The worst profiteers in Chicago are the casket makers," Cahill said in demanding that the city council probe the high cost of dying.

"Poor persons are called upon to pay from \$200 to \$500 for an ordinary wooden box, with a few plush trimmings and nickel-plated handles. Use of a motor car for about two hours costs \$15. I am informed the very cheapest kind of casket costs \$150."
