CIVIC SLACKERS.

On the occasion of the last primary in Oregon a man was asked if he was going in to vote. He was at the time just passing the polling place, and all he had to do was to walk in and mark his ballot. It would have taken him about five minutes. "Oh, no," he said, "I never bother about voting at the primary." "But the primary is the place where the thing is really fixed up," some one said. "Oh, yes, I suppose so," he replied. "But I can't afford to take the time." This man was a person of some intelligence who has a good sized business and a comfortable home on a pleasant street. It seems incredible that anyone who had property and personal interests to care for would take that position. Yet there are thousands just like him, and their failure to do their share in securing good government causes many of the troubles from which the country suffers. A man like that may argue that his one vote would make no difference. Yet if all the well meaning people take that position the whole crowd of them would stay at home, and the grafters and self seekers and the cranks would run the government unchecked. The man who takes this indifferent attitude is really about the same as the slacker who dodged war service. Only there is more excuse for them because they were asked to place their lives in peril for their country. All that is asked of the good citizen today is that he give up a very little of his time, which he should do anyway to protect his own personal and family interests. The man who won't do his duty as a citizen not merely makes himself appear very foolish and shows lack of sense and judgment, but he reveals himself as a shirker who expects his neighbors to carry the burdens, but will not take them on his own shoulders.

The world stands aghast at the dreadful news from Smyrna, Asia Minor, where 250,000 Christian people are recently supposed to have lost their lives at the hands of the avenging Turks. This frightful tragedy could never have happened, if these barbarous people had not received outside assistance. Indignation will run high in this country against any government that has equipped this army for this fiendish slaughter. It is a land of cruelty and revenge, and the Turks may have had some provocation for their deeds of horror. But they are the supreme offenders when it comes to acts of murder and rapine. The United States should exert the strongest possible influence to hold them within the bounds to which their populations fairly belong. And some way must be found to obtain security for the Christian peoples that live within this territory.

On Sunday afternoons on the leading automobile routes within driving distance of any good sized city, one observes long processions of automobiles tearing around the country, many running at high rates of speed, some getting smashed up. The vast number of people thus engaged shows the intense dislike of the age for quiet, and its keen desire for motion and something new. Up to a certain point it is a healthful tendency. It gives people fresh air and needed change and may on the whole be a physical benefit. If people would indulge in such a diversion in moderation it would be wholly helpful.

Freak legislation in this state has been good pastime for many astute politicians during the past fifteen years and there is a likelihood that these wisecracks will continue to harass the state government until they swing into eternity.

Penmanship Worker Visits City Schools

Miss Maude Williams, field representative of the A. N. Palmer Penmanship company, spent yesterday in Roseburg visiting the three Roseburg grade schools demonstrating in each school before the pupils and teachers the proper technique in hand writing. The Palmer system is now almost universally used in the United States and the company maintains thirty-five field representatives who make yearly visits to the largest schools in each state giving actual class room instruction and pointing out the fundamentals of the system.

Miss Williams met with the City Superintendent and grade teachers and principals in the high school building after school hours yesterday and went into minute detail as to the proper method of handling this important branch of the school curriculum. She urged each teacher to take up correspondence work with the company and to obtain penmanship certificates. All of the teachers in the Roseburg schools are to take this course and are entering into the task of penmanship improvement with great enthusiasm.

Miss Williams stated to City Superintendent M. S. Hamm, that the work in upper grades in the Roseburg schools compares very favorably with other schools in the country but that the penmanship in the lower grades is not up to the average.

Miss Williams has been in demonstration work for several years and has also had a great deal of experience in class room work. In her present position she has the opportunity of visiting the largest schools in the six northwest states and thereby comes in close touch with the operation of them and when asked how the Roseburg schools compare with others in regard to organization and administration she very emphatically stated that the local schools are at the top of the hundreds of schools which she visits.

Espes Officials Visit In Roseburg

E. L. King, superintendent of the Southern Pacific Co., and John M. Scott, general passenger agent, who have their headquarters in Portland, were visitors in Roseburg for several hours today. Both officials stated that working conditions on the Portland division are back to normal and no efficiently is the work being carried on in the Brooklyn yards and other shop terminals that a large number of cars are being brought from California to be re-built. They stated that the local force, although very large at present, will be increased to handle this additional business. At present the work of rebuilding the cars is being carried on at the Brooklyn shops but as soon as the local force is increased many of the cars will be stopped at Roseburg for repairs.

They stated that the car shortage at the present time is very serious proposition. Although the shortage existed during the green fruit season the Southern Pacific company was able to move the produce without loss to the growers, which is considered a wonderful record in the face of the car shortage.

Both Mr. Scott and Mr. King were well pleased with conditions locally.

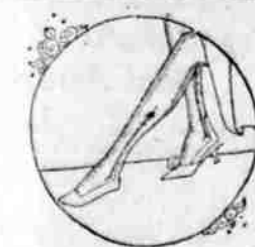
