Wet Issue to Be Fought to Limit After Election

(International News Service.)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—Congress will be called upon to register amendment on amendment of the act by legalizing the sale of beer and light wines as soon as it convenes after the November election.

The "wet" in the House, it was said, will force the issue before the vote of the present body expires March 4. They hope either to follow the election or to the groundwork for a victory in next house, which, they contend, show added "wet" strength. A bill now pending was introduced by Representative Hill (rep.) of Maryland, which would legalize the sale of beer and light wines having a 2.75 per cent alcohol content, by taxing them under the revenue act. It would place a tax of 20c a gallon on such beverages, including cider. The measure would first create a local option district, so that communities which are entirely "dry" would not be forced to permit their sale. The people of each district would vote whether they wanted beer, light wines, and if the vote were in favor the Volstead Act would not apply unless their alcoholic content exceeded the 2.75 per cent limit.

Mother Fears For Daughter's Life

work neither suffered to any great extent and were able to travel last night, although still weak.

Mrs. Pettibone's daughter, Mrs. Batchelor, is thought to have left several days ago from San Francisco, traveling in slow stages for Portland. She is traveling alone in a Ford roadster and it is feared that she would be murdered by the murderer. Immediately following the discovery of the existing conditions, the Portland police who are endeavoring to locate the man believed to be responsible for the poisoning attempt, telegraphed the officers along the highway in an effort to halt Mrs. Batchelor. It was reported that she left Ashland shortly after 10 o'clock yesterday morning, a telegram signed with her name having been sent from there at that time.

The telegram to Sheriff Starmer instructing him to hold Mrs. Batchelor here was received at 5 o'clock, and officers were immediately detailed to watch for her. She was not seen, however, and telephone messages were sent to towns in the northern part of the county but no trace of her was found. A local service station employee saw a woman answering her description late in the evening but could not furnish any positive evidence. It is possible that the telegram that Mrs. Batchelor had left San Francisco was faked by the would be murderer, but all attempts to locate her thus far have failed and the officers are beginning to fear that the plot may have been carried through successfully.

The man suspected of the crime has so far eluded the Portland police. He is alleged to have stolen considerable clothing belonging to the son before departing from Portland where he was last seen.

The mother and son have been in the city all day watching the highway in an effort to prevent Mrs. Batchelor from passing through. Every car coming from the south has been under their surveillance but up until a late hour this afternoon she had not been seen.

Family differences and misunderstandings are believed by Mrs. Pettibone to be responsible for the condition which now exists.

Late this afternoon the officers here commenced work on the theory that the man responsible for the poisoning attempt had already made away with Mrs. Batchelor and that the telegram was sent to aid in making his escape. The officers are working on the theory that the man before going to Portland killed Mrs. Batchelor and then went to the Pettibone home in Portland and made an attempt to kill the mother and her son. When his plan failed, he probably left hurriedly and caught train No. 13 from Oregon City. This train reached Ashland at 10 o'clock on Monday morning, the time the telegram was sent, and it is quite probable that he sent the message signed with her name, with the hope that it would turn the search from himself to an effort to locate the young woman. This is the theory which the Roseburg officers are endeavoring to trace at this time.

Son-in-Law Caught.

PORTLAND, Oct. 24.—A. F. Batchelor, aged 26, is being sought by the authorities on suspicion. Mrs. C. A. Pettibone alleges that Batchelor, her son-in-law, placed poison in her coffee and in that of her son and then fled, and that he possibly killed his wife, Helen Batchelor. Mrs. Pettibone alleges that her son-in-law came to her home and said that Helen was hiding from police authorities in California, having killed a man in Fresno in self defense. He asked her to say nothing about the case. The next morning she alleges that he prepared coffee and that after drinking it she became ill. He refused to help her and instead picked up his suit case and left, saying as he departed that he would never see her again in this world. Her son, Charles, called a physician and an emetic relieved her condition.

Bullet Breaks Window.

A spent bullet fired from the vicinity of Edenbower, yesterday broke a window at the Soldiers Home. The bullet struck the window behind the adjutant's desk and threw considerable glass into the room. The flattened bullet was found by Commandant Riddle. It was fired from a .32 calibre rifle.

SCHOOL BUDGET COMMITTEE NAMED

Committee Will Meet In Near Future to Outline Expenses For Coming Year.

PROPOSE NEW SYSTEM

Experiment to be Tried to Eliminate Congestion in Primary Classes at Rose School—Provision Made for Inter-School Contests.

The regular meeting of the school board was held last night at the high school building, and the budget committee appointed. Those elected to serve on this committee were A. A. Wilder, A. N. Orcutt, W. F. Harris, H. C. Darby and John Runyan. The committee meets with the school board and outlines the proposed expenditures for the ensuing year and determines the amount to be levied. The school board determined to change the time for the attendance of pupils in the primary grade at the Rose school. The primary class is badly overcrowded there and there is not room for another class to be provided. At the present time the primary pupils attend school from 9 to 11 o'clock in the morning and from 1 until 3 in the afternoon.

It is now planned to divide the classes and take one from 9 to 12 o'clock in the morning and the other from 1 to 4 in the afternoon. The pupils who attend the morning class will not be required to attend the afternoon and vice versa. This is being tried in the nature of an experiment. Something must be done to relieve the congestion and this is the best plan the board is able to conceive at this time. The pupils will all get the same amount of instruction as at the present time but will be given more individual attention as the classes will be smaller. More work will be required of the teacher who will work longer hours. It was also decided to allow the grade schools one-quarter of a day

each month for interschool literary and athletic contests. Only the members of the team, however, will be released from their studies to participate in these contests. Other contests and games must take place outside of school hours or upon Saturdays and other holidays.

The resignation of J. W. Stoops

as janitor at the Fullerton school was accepted. No appointment has yet been made.
