### Prune Market Shows Reduction

SALEM, Oct. 25.—Efforts of some buyers to bear the market, which has been advancing steadily for the past two weeks, is the latest development in the prune situation in the Willamette valley. Some buyers are still bidding for the choicer lots on a basis of 1 cent for 40-45¢, with a straight half cent drop straight down through and including the 60's.

That the reduction is a purely bearish move to tease obstinate growers is evidenced by the fact that there is nothing incident to the general condition of the market that creates any weakness. Everything points to a stronger market.

Definite figures on the prune crop the Pacific coast place the California yield at 150,000,000 pounds, or only 100,000,000 pounds short of the estimates on which orders were placed and the figures on the crop the entire Northwest have now yielded down to 45,000,000 pounds, about 15,000,000 pounds below estimates.

Despite the fact that practically all the buying of the past two weeks has been for export, that the eastern buyers are clean of prunes and domestic buyers have done practically nothing, there remains in the hands of growers of the Northwest only about 12,000,000 pounds of prunes. ### Sutherland Feels Car Shortage

SUTHERLIN, Oct. 25.—The car shortage is holding up apple shipments from Sutherland valley, and unless relief is forthcoming soon the situation is liable to result in considerable loss to growers and shippers. While Agent M. C. Bond is doing all he can to obtain cars, he finds it practically impossible to secure a sufficient number to meet the demand.

The Guy Conner company was obliged to close down its local packing plant the first of the week owing to its inability to obtain cars in which to make shipments. This company has only been able to ship two cars. It has two or three carloads ready for shipment, while its floors are full of apples waiting to be graded.

The Oregon Growers has two carloads of apples ready for shipment which are being held until cars can be provided. The floors of the building are full of apples which are being graded as rapidly as possible and packed for shipment. Thus far the Growers association has been unable to make any shipments of apples owing to its inability to obtain cars. The John A. Eck Co. has between three and four cars ready for shipment, but like the other plants, are waiting for cars. The company has several carloads of Spitzenbergs and Newtown apples on its floors, which are being graded and packed as rapidly as possible, but it may be several days yet before it will be able to load its first car.

On Tuesday Agent M. C. Bond succeeded in securing two cars for the growers and one for the Guy Conner company, which somewhat relieved the situation at these plants.
