Her composure was not ruffled and she expressed a readiness to face Mrs. Jane Gibson, her accuser. Mrs. Hall said that she was not at the Phillips farm on the fatal night. Mrs. Gibson had said that Mrs. Hall was present and aided in the killing. This is Mrs. Hall's first official statement.

CIVIL WAR VETERAN NOT CITIZEN, FINDS

NOWATA, Nov. 1.—Jas. Meadowcraft, 77 years old, labored under the delusion that he was a citizen of the U. S. for 69 years. Imagine his consternation when, after serving under the stars and stripes for four years during the civil war and voting for nearly 30 years, Meadowcraft discovered he was a subject of England, having been born in that country. That was eight years ago.

Naturalization papers were issued recently to the aged man. Immediately following his discovery he stopped voting and exercising other rights of American citizenship and instituted plans to become a citizen.

Authorities declared he is the oldest person to be given naturalization papers in this country.

Portland Woman Tells of Suffering

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—Fifth, peace and death followed the Turkish occupation of Smyrna, according to Dr. Esther Lovejoy, of this city. Dr. Lovejoy, president of the International Medical Women's association, was the only American woman present during the Turkish occupation of Smyrna. She returned recently to her home here.

Only a few days ago cholera was discovered in Smyrna and since the refugees have been transferred to many different ports the disease is bound to spread. Many dead bodies are still floating about the docks. The streets are in an unspeakable state and probably will not be cleaned for weeks. The simplest sanitation is out of the question.

"I went to Smyrna," says Dr. Lovejoy, "with an open mind and no biased opinions, and for a long time I retained that attitude. The Turkish soldiers have a great respect for the American uniform, and I noticed that when an American was in evidence the Turkish treatment of Christians was much modified."

"When I reached Smyrna all but the Turkish quarter was a smoldering ruin, and the docks were simply alive with refugees. The Turkish quarter, however, was in no way damaged, and the barracks seemed to be doing more business than before the disaster.

"When Christian women were compelled to leave their homes they took with them only a few of their belongings. As women will, they wore their best clothes, and most of them had on high-heeled shoes. After those women had been on the docks of Smyrna for two weeks and their clothes were torn and muddy and bedraggled the effect was weird. The high-heeled shoes had been lost in the mud rash. Most of the women were barefooted.

"The entire city beyond two blocks from the docks was in the hands of the Turks, and after nightfall no one knew exactly what took place. In the

dark piercing screams were heard—one taken up by another—and in a short time the entire section was a howling, blood-curdling bedlam. We could see nothing, but we knew the morning would bring tales of missing daughters.

"American sailors did much to aid the suffering. In their clean white uniforms they stood out in contrast to the poor, starving people they were guarding. The sailors were sometimes reprimanded by their officers for going outside of their line of duty in their eagerness to aid women and children.

"The women did not dare to enter a house. They were afraid of being outraged should they leave their places on the docks. For two weeks they lived on the same wharf, not daring to leave their line of duty in their eagerness to aid women and children.

"Many men of military age cut their throats when they saw that it was hopeless to try to escape. One old man came to us to help him find his daughter, whom he had left in a little shed. He had gone to

search for bread. When he returned she had disappeared. We told the father we could not find her. He pulled a knife. I was unable to prevent him. He cut his throat and fell at my feet.

"The man in charge of loading the refugees aboard the boats was called 'the packer.' He actually did pack the people aboard.

"I was called upon for a case of childbirth in the hold of one of these steamers. The women were almost wedged in. The air was so close that the atmosphere was humid.

"It was almost necessary to pry the women out to take her on deck. Here a bed was improvised with a chicken crate and a life preserver. The woman was terribly filthy. Her hair was matted, her clothes were torn and muddy, and she wore no shoes."
