Green Diamonds in Africa.

Two discoveries of green diamonds have recently been reported from South Africa. The first, found in the Bloemhof district, was a 51/2 karnt stone, black and opaque, which, on cutting, yielded a jewel of 11/2-knrats of an emerald-green shade. It has been appraised by London experts at about £5,000, or about 100 times the price of a water-white diamond, says the Engineering and Mining Journal-Press. The second green diamond was washed out at Parys, a short time ago. and was of ten karats weight. It has been sent to a government valuator at Cape Town. One of the most celestated green diamonds is the "Dres-den Green," in the Saxon Crown Jewels, which weighs about 40 karats and is apple-green in color.
