SITUATION GRAVE IN NEAR EAST

Panic Reigns in the Foreign Quarter of Constantinople

LAW CABINET AROUSED

Gen. Harrington Enters Sharp Protest to Turkish Commander Following Hostile Maneuvers—Crisis Looms.

(By United Press.)

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 7.—Panic reigned in the city's foreign quarter today as the Turkish Nationalist government military forces advanced close to the barbed wire barricades of the British forces at Shanak.

The Kemalists served notice that the British would not be allowed to advance beyond the three-mile neutral limit.

General Harrington, British Commander, promptly entered a sharp protest to the Turkish commander following this maneuver. Disorders followed the Kemalist civil authorities' occupation of the city and the Moslem military's menacing attitude.

Four British soldiers were stabbed in street fighting. The Greeks fled toward Salonika, fearing unprecedented massacres.

Will Maintain Order

(By Associated Press.)

PARIS Nov. 7.—The allied high commissioners at Constantinople have asked the governments for authorization to take the necessary measures to maintain order in Constantinople and will declare martial law if necessary. The French dreadnaught, Jean Bart, will join the allied fleet at Constantinople.

Kemalists Enter Area

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 7.—(A. P.)—The Turkish Kemalists report that the British have evacuated Mosul on the Tigris in Mesopotamia and that the Kemalists have entered the evacuated area.

Three additional classes of Turkish soldiers have been called to the colors.

All Kemal Bey, editor of the anti-Nationalist newspaper Sabah has been arrested and condemned to death by the Turkish authorities here.

The allied representatives have given Rafet Pasha the new civil governor of the city 48 hours to release the editor.

Realizes Near East Crisis.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—(United Press.)—Lord Derby, minister of war in the Bonar Law cabinet, was summoned hurriedly to London today in connection with the Near East crisis.

The interruption of Derby's speaking tour is considered a sign that the cabinet views the menace at Constantinople as extremely grave.
