ELECTION RETURNS ATTRACTS CROWDS

News-Review Office Besieged For Hours by Hundreds of Anxious Citizens.

SERVICE WAS COMPLETE

County, State and National Returns Given Out By Projecting Machine, and Radio Broadcasting—Public Gratified.

Returns from the most bitterly contested election held in the state in recent years were received by the News-Review last night, and owing to a prearrangement with all precincts in the county and the state at large, the service rendered the public by this paper was the best that has ever been furnished the people of Roseburg, or, perhaps, any city in the southern part of Oregon. That this excellent service was immensely appreciated by the public, was evidenced in the fact that before the polls were closed in the city, the crowd began to assemble in front of the News-Review office, every one anxiously awaiting the first information from outside points. Under the present system of counting as fast as the ballots were cast, it was expected that returns would begin to arrive early, but no one hardly was prepared to have reports turned in at 8 o'clock. However, one precinct, Drain, rung up almost immediately after the polls closed and telephoned in complete returns from that town, showing that Pierce had carried the precinct by 55 votes. This fact appeared to forecast the lead that the La Grande man maintained all through the evening, and friends of the democratic candidate were correspondingly jubilant.

As fast as the returns came in, results from each precinct, in so far as the governorship, the school bill and the contest between Quine and Cobb was concerned, were thrown upon a screen in front of this office. This work was simultaneous with the marking of the tally sheets by the clerical force handling the returns. This splendid system of giving the return kept the surging mass of humanity in the streets in good humor, and even ladies and high school students, both boys and girls, stayed up until midnight to read the bulletins flashed every few minutes. These reports were also tabulated in detail upon a big tally sheet posted on the front window of the News-Review office, and in this manner the people waiting outside were kept fully posted on every move made and knew exactly the standing of each candidate.

Another feature of unusual merit was the radio broadcasting of events at Portland and middle west points. A northwest radio manufacturing Co. set was installed in this office for demonstration by Mr. Roy Blum, the local agent. The reports failed to give satisfaction until the ground wires were rearranged, and following such adjustment, the service was excellent most of the time and hugely enjoyed by the several hundred persons in the street. Speeches and announcements that were broadcasted hundreds of miles away were readily picked up here and listened to with great interest. Among the radio messages received in Roseburg last night was one announcing the Kansas state election results, alleging that the democrats had carried everything and the soldiers bonus was overwhelmingly endorsed.

There was no interruption or cessation in the work of receiving returns until after 11 o'clock, by which time about half of the sixty odd precincts in Douglas county had reported in. It was probably nearly midnight when the crowd in front of this office began to show signs of weariness, but at this late hour the status of governor, the compulsory school bill and legislative establishment, and the Oregonian had at that time conceded the election to Pierce. It was not, however, until nearly morning that the News-Review force left their posts, but they were on the job again at eight a. m. to finish up the task of compiling returns from the towns or so precincts that had been unable to complete their count last night.

The Judgeship Contest
During the early part of last night the county judgeship contest was probably the most interesting feature outside of the Quine-Pierce vote. The vote at first gave Quine a slight lead, but this was cut down as the evening wore on until Cobb was running an even race with Judge Quine, and even got the better of the count. Down street precincts however, had not reported in, and the final result was not in doubt all the time, and this morning was yet undecided. Reports from Clallam Bend 3:30 gave Quine a trifle the best of the contest, so that there was constantly an electrifying situation to what the watchfulness of friends of both candidates for the office, Reedsport, Smith River, Scottsburg, Elkton, and some smaller precincts later reported in with majorities for Quine, giving the election to him by approximately 150 votes.

Unique Methods Used by Uncle Sam's 'Dry' Men

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Buyers of bootleg whiskey visiting the haunts of bootleggers may be buying from government agents.

The answer is that the government is "planting" its enforcement operatives in the bootleg headquarters. Federal agents are adopting varied disguises. They appear as bums, entering some strange town. They are taken in by the bootleggers, who are moved not by pity, but by the selfish purpose to use the alleged "bum" as a tool to palm off their wares.

The "bum" later turns up in the headquarters of the state prohibition director, with records and charts that offer the key to the bootlegging industry in the sections covered by their operations.

Total bootlegging has been curtailed by another very shrewd method of the enforcers. Government agents skilled in the art of crime detection and wise to the ways of the bootlegger, suddenly show up in the most fashionable hostilities. They are for the time being gentlemen of leisure, with lavish programs of entertainment for their friends.

A hotel guest, on the law of averages, can muster a big flock of guests, without much advance notice, by a pronouncement that he is to have a "rump party." The "boys" fall over each other getting in on the big time. The alleged wealthy host, who has blown in from some more or less indistinct "manufacturing centre" is none other than a rum raider. He gains the confidence of the bell boys, the porters and the waiters by his profligate demeanor. He flashes rolls of banknotes with reckless abandon. The tip goes around the hotel that a new "sucker" has arrived. He's the "fall guy" think these smart young fellows who are lying around waiting to make easy coin on the liquor clean-ups.

The prosperous gent, who idles around with lots of cash, buying gaudy drinks for the crowd gathered about him in his suite of ornate rooms, stays long enough to get the goods and soon disappears.

Battle of Wits
In the war on illicit distilling in rural districts operatives have been put to their wits' ends. The rural dweller may look the unsuspecting part, but agents have found him the wisest type of "bird" yet encountered. It's a joke among government agents themselves that the "corn likker" expert would rather take a shot at them with his musket than go to a festival.

Your prohibition raider therefore adopts the simplest ways known to men. He migrates suddenly to the country, with a two weeks' growth of beard, and seeks a humble job in a region suspected of being a moonshine center. He will do any handy thing and isn't quarrelsome about pay. He appears as an honest-looking man wanting work and needing a badly. Sometimes he ventures into the dangerous fastnesses of the mountain districts. Sometimes he does not come out alive. But that is another story. The odds are in his favor that with caution he will eventually emerge with the proof that the government wants.

The disguises adopted in the hunt for liquor makers and vendors are as numerous as the brands of cheap concoctions that are being peddled under the name of "whiskey." The net result is that illicit liquor making is growing to be a mighty precarious pastime. It is not doubted that its profits for the liquor distiller are great while the going is good but when the hands of the law fall upon the unwary, the quickly amassed profits begin to dwindle in lawyers' fees and other court costs which may exhaust the quickly made fortunes of the moonshiners, besides a collection of other reserves that may fall in the path of those arraigned before the courts.

Neuritis in the Fingers and Hands Has Been Traced to the Pressure on Nerves.

Be careful not to bind the strap of your wrist watch too tight. Several cases of neuritis in the fingers and hands has been traced to this cause. Dr. John S. Stopford tells in the Lancet of a student who experienced tingling pains along the inner borders of the hand and in the little finger. These had persisted for some time and caused discomfort and anxiety. On examination a tender point was discovered on the dorsal surface of the styloid process of the ulna, and pressure in this situation caused pain to radiate from this point into the dorsal cutaneous branch of the ulnar nerve. There was no sign of paresis or atrophy of any of the intrinsic muscles of the hand, nor were any trophic changes found. On investigating a cause for this localized neuritis the only possibility appeared to be the wearing of a tight wristlet watch, which clearly could produce compression of the dorsal cutaneous branch of the ulnar nerve as it curved round the lower extremity of the ulna. On discarding the wristlet the discomfort gradually disappeared.

CARS STILL ARE SHORT.

HOOD RIVER, Nov. 8.—While the supply of refrigerator and boxcars for hauling apples is said by shippers here to show considerable improvement since concerted action was taken last Thursday by the newly formed Hood River Traffic association, the rolling stock is still far from sufficient.

Embargoes by eastern rail lines are a worry to local shippers. The embargoes are becoming so general that it is daily more difficult to find an outlet from the Mississippi gateway for apples routed from here to Atlantic seaboard.
