WILLOW, Cal., Nov. 8.—Declaring rice fields injurious to land, and tending to injure home districts, a resolution was recently passed by the Home Protection association of Glen county calling upon the board of supervisors to create zones throughout the county in which rice-growing is barred.

The association is composed mostly of general farmers. There a number of members in Colusa county, as well as Glen. The purpose is to restrict the raising of rice to certain lands, and eliminate it from general farming belts.
