ARE SEEKING BUSINESS IN MOSCOW

(The Associated Press.) MOSCOW, Nov. 8.—More representatives of French commercial firms have been visiting Russia this week than at any time since the war. They have come to negotiate with the government for concessions of various kinds, while others are here to sell goods.

The first concession to be granted to a French company under the Soviet plan was that of the municipality of Moscow, by which deal a group of buildings on Paris are given a 49 year lease upon certain city blocks. Buildings are to be improved by French and subleased for business purposes, or as living quarters. The company, paying the city government each year a certain percentage of income.

Moral Revival World's Need, Says Pastor

LONDON, Nov. 7.—World codes must be revised in conformity with the teachings of Christ, according to Viscount Astor, if Christianity is not to become a failure.

The world is disturbed by new points of view regarding the position of women, class distinction, the movement against alcoholism, the relation of capital and labor, the brotherhood of man. Hosts of citizens are challenging these new advances, the Viscount said.

America is now in the midst of a great moral struggle that may influence the trend of Christianity, the Viscount said. America gave up intoxicants, but as with many a man who has done likewise, the American people are experiencing a moral struggle as to whether or not they are able to carry out their resolution. The cause of Christianity must be affected one way or another by the result of this struggle.

France is a drawback to the progress of Christianity, the Viscount indicated.

"France," he says, "seems often very materialistic. Women's outlook, which is usually more moral and spiritual than man's, has but little influence on French national policy."

"Parisian life exemplifies too closely the saying: 'Eat, drink and be merry, for to-morrow we die.'"

"On the whole French opinion, even in the provinces, considers man to be a sensual animal, and expects the government to make unchastity as safe for him as possible."

Throughout the world, as in France, temperance and chastity are challenged, the Viscount said, but Christianity has not failed.

"What the world needs now is fearless leadership and honest thinking. Democracy and Christianity have not failed where and when they have been properly tried. Christianity has not failed. It cannot have failed, because it has not been really tried, fully applied and understood."

"Democracy is not wrong, because we are not yet able or willing to apply the ideas of the brotherhood of man."

"There are indications of an awakening or resurrection from materialism, selfishness, self-indulgence and thoughtlessness, the awakening of our common conscience on the traffic in women and children, on the deception of alcohol, on slums and war. All these are hopeful signs that we are striving to arise out of mental satisfaction and out of mere selfish physical enjoyment and are indications of vitality and progress."

State Press Comment

BOOSTING YOUR CANDIDATE

Electioneering this year is becoming the chief pastime of active partisans of both of the leading political parties. Such an active interest in political matters is highly commendable when it is done for the public good. If a man thinks his candidate is the best qualified for the position and can convince someone else of that fact, he is really performing his duty. But the electioneer must remember that on 8 o'clock of election morning his efforts must cease. The state laws provide that there shall be no campaigning after the polls have opened.

The election laws are stringent. They provide heavy penalties for those who violate them. Even the newspaper on that day cannot print anything which might be construed as urging the voter to cast his ballot one way or the other. So the man who wishes to boost for his candidate should do his best work this week and remember that others may be waiting for an opportunity on election day to get him in wrong.

The election laws of the state are:

Section 3516, L. O. L.—"It shall be unlawful for any person to pay another for any loss or damage due to attendance at the polls, or in registration, or for the expense of transportation to or from the polls. No person shall pay for personal service to be performed on the day of any election, for any purpose directly or indirectly to affect the result thereof, except for the hiring of persons whose sole duty is to act as challengers and watch the count of official ballots. No person shall buy, sell, give or provide any

political badge, button or other insignia to be worn at or about the polls on the day of election, and no such political badge, button or other insignia to be worn at or about the polls on an election day."

Section 3518—"It shall be unlawful for any person at any place on the day of any election to ask, solicit, or in any manner try to induce or persuade any voter on such election day to vote for or refrain from voting for any candidate, or the candidate or ticket of any political party or organization, or any measure submitted to the people."

Sections 3411 and 3412—"In preparing his ballot any elector shall be at liberty to use or copy any colored or sample ballot, which he may choose to mark or to have marked in advance, to assist him in marking the official ballot."—Grants Pass Courier.

NO PRE-WAR PRICES

A careful perusal of the entire subject has convinced the Harvard committee on economic research that no return to pre-war prices can be expected for at least 10 years.

The news is a little disheartening, but it might be worse. The nation has learned a good deal about thrift in the last few years and, in spite of the continued high cost of living, as a whole has weathered the depression with surprising vigor. With this increased knowledge of wise spending, better times should see them vastly better off, even if prices refuse to descend. Wages are still well above pre-war figures, and while this helps to keep prices up it also helps to meet them.

The main thing is for everybody to remember that it was little old thrift which enabled the nation to survive the war prices and the business slump, and perseverance in this same virtue will mean prosperity in the next 10 years, no matter what happens to prices.—Albany Democrat.
