GULF COAST OIL FIELD ENDANGERED BY FIRE

(By Associated Press.) HOUSTON, Texas, Nov. 12.—The most disastrous fire in the history of the gulf coast oil field is burning in the Humble sector, 17 miles northeast of Houston. Three quarters of a million barrels of oil are afire with a stiff wind blowing. Two million barrels of oil are endangered. The fire started from lightning yesterday.

ORDER REQUESTED FOR MORE RAILROAD LINES

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—An order requiring the railroads operating in Oregon to build several hundred miles of new line within that state was sought today from the interstate commerce commission in a complaint filed by the state public service commission. The new lines are necessary, the state authorities alleged, to develop 22,500 square miles, to open up large timber tracts and give the stock industry proper transportation facilities. In addition the state contended that the present facilities impose undue burdens on the shippers because the freight moves over circuitous routes and that the military interests require a north and south line just east of the Cascades. The line asked is from Oakridge, Southern Pacific terminal, east to Crane, an Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company terminal. The second line crossing this asked for is from Bend, a Spokane, Portland and Seattle terminal to Kirk, another Southern Pacific terminal. Several branch lines were also asked for.

Powers Woman Hurt In Wreck

Mrs. H. P. Esfield, of Powers, received a broken collar bone and a broken rib yesterday afternoon, when the car in which she and her husband were riding turned turtle on Camas Mountain. They were coming this way when the car got from under control on the rough road and ran up a steep bank and then turned over. The car fell on the woman who was badly bruised in addition to the broken bones. She was brought to this city where her injuries were treated by Dr. Hoover. She and her husband obtained quarters in a local hotel where they will remain until she is able to travel again.

HELD ON AUTO THEFT CHARGE.

O. A. Park, of Yakima, Wash., was arrested here yesterday charged with driving a car out of Washington with only a conditional contract to show his possession of the machine. According to the local officers, it is a theft to drive a car on which there is a conditional contract of sale, out of the state unless permission has been obtained. Park claims to have bought the car at Yakima and traded in a Ford for \$160, this being the first payment. He was to have made another payment the 10th of the month, but before it became due he left the state with the machine. The car was a Dixie Flier and was bearing a Ford license plate.

ARRESTED FOR DRUNKENNESS.

J. R. Brown was arrested Saturday night by the city police charged with drunk and disorderly conduct. He posted \$20 cash bond to guarantee his appearance today, but failed to make his appearance and the money was declared forfeited.

NATIONS DEADLOCKED AT PEACE CONFERENCE

(By United Press) PARIS, Nov. 2.—England and France are deadlocked over the Lausanne peace conference. The French are demanding that the conference be held as soon as possible. Lord Curzon holds that England and France should formulate a program before the conference. The Turks are impatient, having announced that a postponement of the final conference would hasten a Turco-Allied clash. Mussolini, the Italian premier, seeking to mediate the difficulty, suggested that the foreign ministers meet next week end at Lausanne where the formal Turkish peace conference was to have been held this morning. Mussolini's meeting would be a preliminary to the general conference.
