

DOUGLAS SENATOR TO HEAD STATE SENATE

Hon. B. L. Eddy Prominently Mentioned for the Presidency

KUBLI HAS SPEAKERSHIP

Early Political Forecasts Concerning the "Head Gear" of the Next Session of the Oregon Legislature Is Discussed.

PORTLAND, Nov. 12.—With the speakership contest seemingly settled, and K. K. Kuhl of Multnomah apparently certain of election by virtue of enough written pledges to hold his majority in line, the interest of legislative politicians is now centered upon the senate organization and who will win out there.

The turn of the wheel which has thrown the speakership to Multnomah county, from all present appearances, has at the same time carried the fortunes of Gus Moser and Bert Parrell, both of Multnomah, down. As a result, most of the observers contend that those two are, to all practical purposes, out of it, while Senator B. L. Eddy of Douglas has come to the forefront with his candidacy.

Two or three circumstances are combining to put Eddy forward just now, and to push Moser and Parrell back. For one thing, the old argument of geography figures prominently in the arguments being made, it being insisted that since the speakership is to come to Multnomah, the presidency of the senate should, of right, go to some other county or district of the state.

But there is another thing, Eastern Oregon, and there are seven or eight votes from that district, does not want a Multnomah county president at the coming session. The sagebrush senators, so the lobby has it, would come to Multnomah for all of a prearranged officer would be to their liking. And they would come to Moser last of all.

Moser, as the spokesman of the Multnomah delegation and the exposition adherents at the special session, locked horns with the "Fairbury Fourteen" from Eastern Oregon and other outside counties when the exposition battle finally centered in the senate.

He not only locked horns with them, but he got mad and "hooked 'em," even after the session had adjourned, telling the leaders of that devoted band that he had stood for irrigation and other eastern Oregon legislation in the days gone by, but that "them days is gone forever" so far as he was concerned. And those to whom he imparted the information promised him that they would not forget his promise. And they seem hot to be breaking their word.

Besides that, Moser does not have a united delegation behind him at home. Parrell is out for himself, and he has a friend or so in the delegation, while Moser has but two, besides himself—Clark and Klepper—who shared places on the Orange ticket with him.

Just how many votes Senator Eddy has up his sleeve at the present time is unknown. He says, modestly, that he has a few, but that as far as he will commit himself. Others say, however, that should he be able to combine with the seven votes of the Eastern Oregon delegation he would be over the hump of the elective majority of 16, and safe.

The fact is that the way things look now the seven votes from east of the mountains will have a very potent effect in determining who is to wield the senate gavel during the 1923 session. That delegation has entered into a compact to vote as a unit after they have met and determined, by majority ballot, where to throw those votes.

A good deal of interest is being manifested in what Roy Ritter or Umattila may do. It has been intimated that the Eastern Oregon men may get behind him for the presidency, or behind Jay Epton of Crook county, pick up what votes they can gather that are yet loose and put up a scrap for an Eastern Oregon man. Should they do that it might make a drawn battle between their group and the Eddy camp until the two either could get together or combine the one against the other.

None of all the sectional and other differences, that enter into the organization skirmishes, the remembrance also lurks in the minds of the senators that the election of a president of the senate is also the election of a vice governor of the state, a circumstance which undoubtedly bears added weight just now, with a preponderantly republican senate and a democratic governor elect. No one, of course, is figuring on the early demise of Walter Pierce, but just the same, should anything happen to him in the next two years, the president of the senate would at once become governor under the constitution, a fact that will have its subtle influence with whatever definite alignment may finally be made.

Altogether it is a pretty intricate situation, with Eddy and his supporters and the sagebrush seven standing in the foreground at the present time. By the end of the week the 30 members will be fairly well sorted out and set apart so that the actual relative strength of all the contenders may be seen, that is, of course, provided an agreement is not reached within the next few days that will settle the controversy and determine the organization of the upper house.

The club room was a surprise not only to the new members but to many of the old ones who had not been attending the meetings regularly. The walls of the room have been tinted, curtains hang at the windows and the floors have been varnished. The vets are spending over \$500 for furniture which should arrive within the next few days.

Judge Kanzler attended the initiatory ceremonies and stated that the boys put on the work in a splendid manner.

The initiatory service was followed by the Armistice Day ball, given under the auspices of the Legion and it was one of the most successful events of the day.

JAPS CANNOT BECOME CITIZENS OF THE U. S. (By Associated Press.)

Washington, Nov. 12.—Japan's case is not suitable for naturalization in the United States the supreme court held today.

The court decided two cases, one from Hawaii and one from Washington state. In the Washington case two Japanese, Takashi Yamashita and Charles H. Hekko had been naturalized by the state court, but the secretary of state refused to incorporate their real estate firm on the ground that the naturalization was illegal. The question turned largely upon whether section 269 of the revised statutes restricting naturalization to "free white persons" and those of African descent was still in force.
