

Key Raising Is No Easy Job

County Agent B. W. Cooney, turkey raisers have spent hours of labor and a considerable amount of money in the process of their birds up to the market stage. However, this is not all they will be required to do as they will receive their final

happens that marketing the bird is the most vital stage of the entire year's labors. The way in which this is accomplished will depend upon many things. Some factors will be within the control of the raiser and some will not. Two of the factors will be the fattening of the birds and killing them in a way that meets the demands.

Fattening the Birds.
An ideal finish on a bird is one which shows a nice even blend of fat upon all parts of the body. This can best be accomplished by feeding the birds a food

in oils. The best feed yet devised is corn. The amounts to be fed and times of feeding are very important. It is necessary to understand by most breeders, so that the best grade of turkeys is none too good, and best to bring the fattening birds to a full ration gradually. It is best to put them on a full grain ration in three or four days; ten days is much better. All grow-up birds should see to it that their birds are kept absolutely quiet, with no light. Many may not know that it is a proven fact that a bird will lose their owner's dollars by one unnecessary fatness. There should be available at times plenty of pure fresh water.

Killing the Birds.
This operation, like most others, is subject to the right and wrong. The turkey raiser is only interested in one way and it is briefly how this is accomplished.

First, the market calls for a carcass that has been dry-picked, with body bruises or open skin ruptures. Body bruises are outlaid at a moment's consideration. Dry-picking can be successfully accomplished at a minimum of labor, maximum result by proper bleeding.

the kill. Suspend the bird by a suitable manner so that the head is on a level with the operator's eye. Take the bird's head in the left hand, with the top of the head uppermost. Insert the killing knife in the neck about one inch below the jaw, then make one clean cross cut. If properly done, severe carotid veins; now give the wrist a half turn and this will bring the head uppermost. (Now comes success of the whole operation.) Draw the knife from the throat, to a point just behind a line with eye and base of skull, advance the knife on this line to the lower jaw and give it a slight twist. If

correct thrust of the knife has been made the bird will give a peculiar squawk and every feather on the body will become loosened so picking will be done with satisfaction and ease. If in some manner the operator should puncture the upper brain, result will be just the opposite of what is wanted, and in that case feathers will be set instead of coming out, as will be the case in the lower brain is punctured. Brain produces a contraction of

the muscles and the other a complete relaxation.

It is important that a suitable knife be used for this work. Any local hardware dealer will be able to supply the proper implements to accomplish good work. If not, they can be procured from the Routledge Seed company of Portland at a nominal cost.

After the bird is picked the head should be sponged free from any blood and then wrapped in two or three folds of clean white paper and tied with a string; or better, use one or two small rubber bands. The birds are now ready to be placed in some secure ventilated place to cool. After cooling they are ready to be graded and arranged for final shipment.

"The primrose by the river's brim" is well, probably, after which to name a new face powder.

Upon minds having this peculiar slant, the edict of the forestry department may have a salutary effect. At least, it will curb their operations. And it is to be hoped that it may stimulate them to investigate the way of the order, and thereby—who knows?—revive in them some dim, atrophied appreciation of natural beauty as transcending the mere efforts of man.—Laramie (Wyo) Republican.

CELEBRATE OPENING OF COAST HIGHWAY

President Marshfield Chamber of Commerce Presents Plans For Festivities.

CALIFORNIA WILL JOIN

Highway Associations Of Oregon And California To Meet On Coos Bay And Governors From Three Coast States May Be Present —Roseburg Invited To Participate.

John C. Kendall, attorney at law at Marshfield and president of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, is in Roseburg today for the purpose of meeting with the executive committee of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce to present plans for a celebration next summer to mark the completion of the Roseburg-Coos Bay highway. The residents of Coos Bay are greatly delighted with the completion of this important thoroughfare and are arranging a big celebration to dedicate this highway. The Marshfield Chamber of Commerce is extending an invitation to Roseburg and Douglas county to join in this event and to co-operate in stimulating a spirit throughout the state for the development of the coast country.

"We people on Coos Bay feel that the completion of the coast highway is a wonderful thing," Mr. Kendall said today. "When the railroad was built we held a monster celebration and Governor Withycombe joined Marshfield and Eugene in holy week, but we are of a polygamous nature, and we now feel that the completion of the highway is as great an improvement to our section as the railroad, and we are anxious to meet the people of Roseburg and become better acquainted with them."

Coos Bay has been chosen as the meeting place for the Redwood Highway Association of California and the Roseburg Coast Highway of Oregon, and we feel that it will be a fine thing to have these two associations meet at the same time and to hold these conventions simultaneously with our celebration dedicating the coast road. Last year we went to Crescent City, Cal., the governor of Oregon and the highway commission being represented together with the county courts of the several counties. This year California has promised to send its governor and highway commission to Coos Bay, and we also hope to have Governor Hart there in addition to the state officials."

Mr. Kendall is also presenting another important matter. The Coos Bay cities, after many years of effort, have succeeded in having congress set aside the Coos Head park, as a project to be handled similar to national parks. A commission has been appointed, with Mr. Kendall as chairman, and a plan for developing a great resort there has been made. The site consists of 250 acres, fronting on the ocean and Charleston bay, and it is one of the most scenic spots on the west coast. Forty acres is to be set aside for a camp ground and the remainder will be planned for summer homes. The site is high and well wooded and lies along the ocean beach, so that it is ideal for a summer resort. With the completion of the coast road, it can be easily reached and many people in Roseburg and Eugene, as well as other cities, have been making inquiries. Mr. Kendall says that the committee intends to set aside a number of locations for the residents of the interior cities and is desirous of getting the matter before the people of this community.

Roseburg Ready Last Home Game
