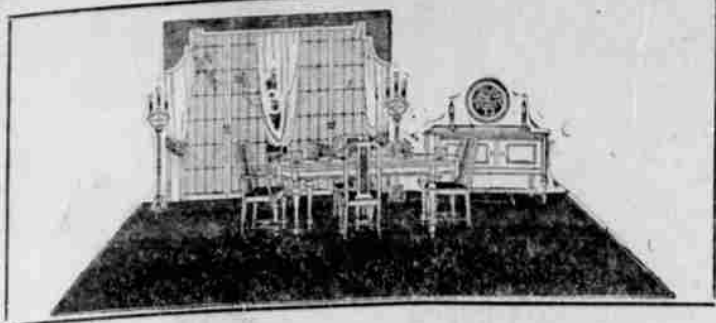

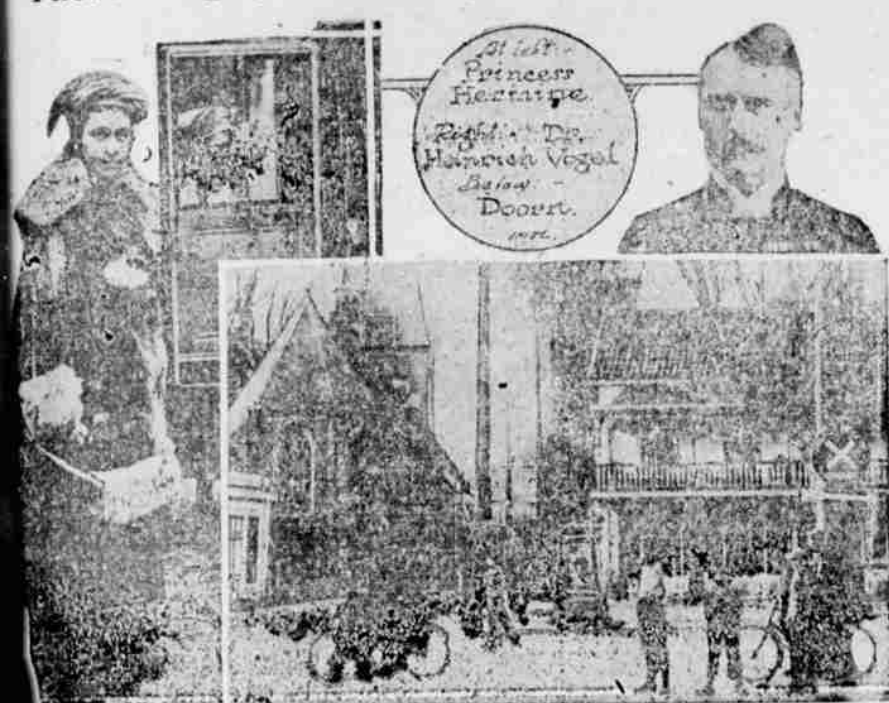

Boy Scouts Plan Training Centers

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—The National Council of the Boy Scouts of America, carrying its program of expansion, has announced its purpose of opening four big national centers for the expert training of scout executives.

Immediate plans are on foot to establish the first of these centers near New York, and the Council is already seeking ground for that purpose. It is hoped to establish other centers, probably one in the middle west, one in the far west and one in the south. This "headquarters in the field" will furnish an opportunity to concentrate experimental work as well as furnish an excellent training center, especially for courses in "How to Train Scoutmasters." If it is not practical to bring the executives to the centers for training along these lines, it will be possible to move the head faculty to different parts of the country.

The scout executive is the salaried official in a big city or community, who makes scouting his business, and directs the volunteer leadership of the movement. For many years there have been available in different parts of the country, various training courses for scoutmasters. The scoutmaster is the volunteer leader who takes charge of a unit called a troop.

Mortimer L. Schiff, who has served as Vice President of the National Council, has recently been appointed International Commissioner of the organization. He will devote his time to the international affairs of the Boy Scouts.

Since the beginning of the scouting in this country over twelve years ago, a total of 4,777 eagle badges, the highest rank in scouting, have been issued. Of this number 1,477 have been allotted since the first of the present year.

It is considered remarkable that such a large proportion of these marks of distinction should have been given out in the past 10 months. In order to attain this much coveted eagle badge, the scout begins as a tenderfoot and climbs up the ladder one rung at a time until he becomes a second class, and then a first class scout. It is at this point that the boy begins to do his real climbing, which calls for training along special lines. After he is a first class scout, he may become a life scout, and then a star scout, and then comes the highest rank, which is Eagle. Eleven of the merit badges the scout must obtain to become an Eagle are specifically in the fields of first aid, life saving, personal health, public health, cooking, camping, civics, bird study, path finding, pioneering, and athletics or physical development.

From now until next February the scout organization will conduct a campaign for more members. It is hoped to increase the enrollment by 100,000 scouts, or twenty-five percent of the present membership.

Proposed Senate Caucus Fails

PORTLAND, Nov. 18.—Attempt to pledge western Oregon state senators to hold a caucus, at the suggestion of the eastern Oregon group of seven, has failed. While this plan was going to pieces yesterday in Portland the supporters of B. L. Eddy, of Douglas, were adding more steam to their drive to place Senator Eddy as president of the state senate.

Following the proposal of the eastern Oregon group that western caucus on president and that the eastern and western groups finally join issues on president, an effort was made to bring this about.

Eastern Senators Foot-Loose.—Only three western senators were found ready to sign an agreement and when others who were expected to sign up declined, the three senators dissolved their agreement by mutual consent. This leaves all of the senators outside of the seven in eastern Oregon foot-loose, save those who are pledged to Senator Farrell. The matter of geography has damaged the cause of Senators Farrell and Moser since Representative Kuhl, of Multnomah, is now assumed of being a speaker.

Some time next week Senators Ritter, Strayer, Taylor, Ellis, Dennis, Upton and Robertson, comprising the eastern Oregon bloc, will get together and vote their sentiments on president. The seven will go to the candidate favored by the majority of four, so that there is no little lobbying going on among the seven.

Votes Are Worth Going After.—It is a bunch of votes worth negotiating for. Senator Eddy hopes to land the seven and Senator Moser entertains similar hopes, as does likewise Senator Farrell. It is quite possible that the seven may advance as a candidate for president one of their own number and some work is being undertaken with that end in view.

Abandonment of the caucus for western Oregon senators has given the eastern Oregon bloc something of a setback and one of the reasons for the failure is that some of the senators who were expected to join are already committed to the candidacy of the senator from Douglas county, and pressure was applied to another to keep out of the caucus as the backers of this senator want him to vote in another direction.

Accident Board's Expenses Drop

SALEM, Nov. 18.—While receipts of the industrial accident commission for the four month period ending October 30 show an increase of \$103,124.55 over those of the same period a year ago the administrative expenses of the department show a decrease of \$10,445.76 this year as compared with last year.

A total of \$829,424.45 was collected by the department between July 1 and October 30, 1922, as compared to \$726,299.90 for the same period a year ago. Expenses for the four month period this year aggregated \$60,947.75 as compared to \$71,395.51 for the same period last year. The expense rate for October is given as 6.78 per cent with that of the four month period 7.35 per cent.

Grand Jury Returns Four Indictments

Four secret indictments and two not true bills were returned this morning by the grand jury which was excused for the term following its report. The indictments were kept secret as the persons named are not yet in custody. Bench warrants were issued for their arrest and they will be brought in as soon as they can be located.

A not true bill was returned in the case of the state against F. C. Spruitt, Jack Connelly, and L. W. Batman. These three were charged with criminal libel by Attorney J. H. Napier of Reedsport following the publication of a circular which was quite generally distributed.

A not true bill was also returned in the case of the state against Minnie C. Ridgeway, who shot her husband in the leg during a family row. This was also a Reedsport case and she was placed under bonds in the Reedsport Justice Court.

Although the Grand Jury investigated the jail and court house no recommendations were returned.

Two Women Are Brutally Murdered

ABERDEEN, Wash., Nov. 17.—Tansy Bolton, 35, Mrs. J. T. O'Brien, 38, and Hjalmar Anderson, 39, are dead today as a result of a double killing and suicide in a cabin at Copalis Beach, an ocean point about 25 miles from here, early this morning. Anderson, according to the police, killed the two women, first hacking Miss Bolton terribly with a knife, and then killed himself.

Jealousy is presumed to have prompted the act, the police say. Miss Bolton made a fight for life, evidently escaping her assailant for a time. Anderson pursued her from the cabin, it is believed, and killed her. Her body was found on the beach this morning by Fred Horn, a storekeeper. Officials later in the day found the body of Mrs. O'Brien in the cabin and that of Anderson outside.

Miss Bolton's throat was slashed and her body, legs and arms were horribly cut. She apparently had escaped from the cabin after Anderson had stabbed her and had then been shot in the back as with her falling strength she ran down the beach.

Mrs. O'Brien's body was found at the side of a bed in the cabin. She had been shot through the breast and had not been slashed with the knife.

Anderson's body, a revolver in one hand and a pocketknife in the other, was found back of Frank Road's cabin, 200 feet from the shack where the women were killed.

The attack took place in a cabin inhabited by John Berg, 60 or 65 years old, and the two women. Berg told the officers that Anderson had come to the cabin about midnight last night. As Berg had gone to sleep the women and Anderson were arguing about something. When he awoke early this morning the three were scuffling in his room. He said he escaped from the cabin after receiving a cut on his arm from Anderson's knife. He took refuge under a log behind the cabin and later returned to the shack. He said he had not enough strength left when he returned to do anything.
