WINEMAKING IS MOVING EASTWARD SAY REPORTS

(The United Press)
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20.—Winemaking is moving east, the California Grape Growers' association complains.

Figures show that only 58,547 tons of wine grapes were used in the manufacture of wine in California in 1921. The amount of grapes used in the state has decreased since 1917 by almost 225,000 tons, it is said.

While this reduction has taken place, the volume of wine grapes sent east increased from 885 cars in 1912 to 18,302 cars in 1921.

San Bernardino county led the state in the production of sweet wines in 1921, according to reports. San Joaquin county was second, Fresno county third, Sacramento county fourth, Santa Clara county fifth, Alameda county sixth, Los Angeles county seventh, Santa Clara county eighth, and Sonoma county ninth.

The quantity of sherry exceeded that of any other wine in 1921. The quantity manufactured was 780,314 gallons. Port was second with 622,073 gallons. The quantity of dry wines exceeded the quantity of sweet wines by more than two to one. Growers of wine grapes received \$26,517,560 for 309,970 tons in 1921.

POLITICIANS ARE READY TO BATTLE

Office Holders In State May Endeavor to Kill the Moser Bill.

LIKELY STRIKE A SNAG

New Governor Will Have the Upper Hand Long Enough to Fire the "Whole Cheese."

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 17.—Politicians are beginning to sniff the smoke of coming battle in the steady, quiet but persistent plans of the "ins" and their friends to clip the wings of the incoming state administration, so far as appointments and patronage is concerned, by the repeal of the so-called "Moser bill," which puts the tenure of appointive offices under the control of the appointing power.

There is no doubt but that some of those who are now on the state payroll by appointment of the governor or of the board of control, together with their friends, are fostering the propaganda for the repeal of the Moser bill as one of the first acts of the coming legislative session. That law provides specifically that the appointing power, whether by the governor or otherwise, shall have the unquestioned power to fire as well as to hire, regardless of any supposed definite term of service. Would Repeal Bill.

As a matter of custom, all, or virtually all, of the commissions that have been issued to appointed state officials make the term definite and and for four years from the date of appointment. But, nevertheless, the Moser law rules, and the official hangs on to his pay check only so long as he is in the good graces of the governor or of the board.

The repeal of the Moser bill would throw all of these tenures back under definite term, and the result would be drawing well toward its close before many of those now holding important appointive positions would retire by expiration of their terms.

Pierce Can Fight.
This would be as it used to be before Governor Withycombe wished to sweep out the remaining West appointees in 1915, a condition that would make for calmness and serenity among the present payroll boys for some little time to come.

But a disquieting rumor has sprung up in political circles to make the proponents of the Moser bill repeat stop, look and listen. Governor-elect Pierce is a friendly sort of an individual, but upon occasion, as his legislative record discloses, he can quickly change into a very efficient fighting man, and after the second Monday of next January he will have more power with which to fight than he ever had as a state senator.

Has Whip Hand.
The disturbing word has come sweeping about the plans for the Moser bill repeal have been growing more definite, that the suggestion has been made to Pierce, and taken under consideration by him, that coincident with the appearance of this repealing bill in the legislature he, a governor, could call for the resignation of "the whole shooting match," and, were these not immediately forthcoming, he could fire the whole outfit out of hand before the repeal could become effective.

Even if the repeal were to be jammed through under suspension of the rules, which would require a two thirds vote, the governor would have five days in which to hold it up before he filed it with the secretary of the state, or vetoed it, as the case might be. And in that length of time he could "clean up" on the payroll boys so effectively that it would make no difference whether the Moser bill was repealed or allowed to stand.

Hoff May Aid.
Then, there is another uncomfortable contingency. It is figured out generally that when it comes to the board of control, State Treasurer Hoff and Pierce will hold the whip hand, and will be more apt to work together than otherwise. Hoff has had a feud for some time with Governor Olcott and Secretary of State Koser appointment, as head of the Boy's Training school, and other matters, and he is still out. He has fled to California to escape the avalanche of office hunters that swooped down on his office right after the election, and will not return until about the first of the year.

Would Have Laugh.
With Hoff and Pierce working together on the board, the whole range of appointments, practically speaking, would be under their control and they would laugh at any effort to tie them up by reestablishing definite tenure of appointment through the very simple expedient of beating the legislature to it.

It is argued that should the legislature carry the fight up to Pierce and Hoff by repealing the Moser bill they could clean house all down the line right off the bat, and later, should they so desire, reappoint any of the subordinate officials whose confidence in office they might determine upon.

Dr. J. W. Morrow, national committeeman, and Dr. C. J. Smith, state chairman, will leave tonight for La Grande to talk things over with Mr. Grande to talk things over with Mr. Pierce, and it is expected that the subject of patronage will have a part in the discussion. After stopping off at La Grande for a short time, Dr. Smith will go on East on a business trip of some five or six weeks' duration.

Senators in the Klan will not vote for Senator Rittner, who is in a receptive mood, for the Klan made an unsuccessful attempt to defeat him in the election. Nor do the Klansmen like Senator Eddy, because he took the stump for Governor Olcott against Walter M. Pierce.
