## Americans Met the Emergency—

## COMMISSION STARTS NEW WORK

LAND, Nov. 22.—That the new commission is fully up to the possible effect of the gubernatorial election on the part of that body was evident today morning as a list of the new members of the commission was opened today, which ran through two, and three days.

In the closing session, it was the members of the commission will agree as to their action on the matter of tendering their letters to Governor Olcott immediately after the December meeting, whatever other course appears.

Work was opened for grading the Pacific highway within limits of Oregon City and

adjacent to Canemah, held up to settle the question of route. It was apparent, although the estimates were not fully compiled and tabulated, that Samuels & Frazier of Salem were the successful bidders among eight participants. The job was offered to the engineers.

Metzger & Johnson of Roseburg, with a bid of \$28,334, were awarded 12.1 miles of gravel surfacing on the John Day highway in Wheeler county, between Service creek and Valades ranch. A bridge across the Malheur river, near Juntura in Malheur county, was referred to the engineers, and a bridge across the Deschutes river near Shearers, on the Dallas-California highway, went to the Union Bridge company for \$5,334.

Wallawa county and the commission now are fully agreed as to the financial relations of the commission and the county, which is behind in its payments to the state, due to slow collection of taxes. The county will pay up as promptly as taxes are collected, the delegation promised.

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Sherman county has \$115,000 to spend on a 50-50 basis with either the state or the federal government on its roads, the delegation told the commission.

Judge Patterson of Grant county asked that the commission proceed with the 14-mile section of the John Day highway from Cummings creek to Coles Bridge, at an estimated cost of \$190,000.

Formal opening of the Oregon City bridge, now nearing completion, will probably be delayed until December 26, or within a few days thereafter, to permit concrete pavement on the west side, highway to "set" before opening it to travel. The bridge will probably be open to foot traffic about December 15, it was reported.

A Coos county delegation, consisting of County Judge Wade, Gene Norton and John Kendall, requested state credit for \$181,717, expended on the route of the Roosevelt highway north of North Bend and a ferry between Glasgow and North Bend. The delegation was told that the commission had agreed to advertise for bids on a short section of the Coquille to Randon route, to be opened December 14.

Klamath county wants a bridge across the Klamath river, a road from the Jackson county line to Klamath Falls and a re-routing of the Dairy to Bonanza road.

Yamhill county is still troubled about the grade crossing at St. Joseph and this question will be ironed out during the present meeting.

Corvallis residents were before the commission today, headed by C. E. Ingalls, asking that the Corvallis-Albany road be completed and made "passable at least."

## Revival Meetings Begin Sunday

On next Sunday, November 26, the Christian church will begin a revival meeting, lasting two weeks, closing Sunday, December 10. The preaching in the meeting will be done by Mr. L. G. Walker, of Centerburg, Ohio, a man of ability and power. Mr. Walker has been at Centerburg for 22 years, and when he left to come on this trip west a great congregation gathered to give him a farewell service and show their appreciation of him. He is well known throughout Ohio and has a son who is one of the foremost men in the brotherhood of the Christian church.

Mr. O. P. Burrus, who will have charge of the music, is a western man. He is both a preacher and singer, and also a good pianist. Mr. Burrus has held a number of successful pastorates in this country and has led the music in a number of successful meetings. As a soloist he is said to be above par. The meeting is open to the public and all will be well treated and will be pleased with the preaching and singing.

## Change in State Fair Law Advised

SALEM, Nov. 22.—Expenditures in connection with the operation of the Oregon state fair were \$197,100.92 for 1922, according to a financial report completed by J. E. McClintock, veteran cashier for the state fair board.

The grand total expended by the fair board in 1921, including the operations of the fair and improvements to grounds and buildings was \$193,920.86.

For 1922 the general expenses of the fair aggregated \$64,423.56, exclusive of premium money received from the state in the amount of \$42,607.36.

State appropriations included \$640.38 for walks and roads, \$1510.92 for buildings and repairs and \$2256.17 for printing and advertising. Total expenditures for 1922, including the expense of the fair operations, premiums and im-

provements to buildings and grounds were \$111,508.43.

In his report to the fair board Mr. McClintock said the increase in administrative expense for 1922, was due to the appointment of a superintendent of buildings and grounds at an annual salary of \$1250.

The method of handling the state fair funds under an act passed at the 1921 session of the legislature was branded as unbusinesslike by Mr. McClintock, and he recommended that the law be repealed at the next session. Under the law in question there is an exchange of funds between the state treasurer and the fair treasurer, Mr. McClintock said, which results in much confusion.

## Ivory Discovered in Tier of Wood

MEDFORD, Nov. 22.—A peculiar "stick" discovered by Curran Turbance at Eighth and Harrison streets, Corvallis, in his basement woodpile, has been identified as part of the tusk of a prehistoric elephant by Dr. John B. Horner, director of Oregon Agricultural college.

The stick is round, three and a half inches in thickness, 12 inches long, and had been sawed off at both ends, indicating that there are at least two more pieces of the same kind. It was at first mistaken for petrified wood and because its weight was unobserved when the wood was piled in the basement it was inferred that the "stick" was petrified while there.

When examined by Oregon Agricultural college authorities, the substance was found to be neither wood nor stone. Upon being exposed to heat it emitted an odor which clearly proved that it was not of vegetable origin, but was composed of animal matter—a fine piece of well preserved ivory.

The stove wood with which it apparently came had been purchased from Carl R. Beeson, who operates a wood yard on Kiger Island about three miles south of Corvallis. The wood was sawed from poles, limbs and underbrush into stove wood lengths for the market, and now Mr. Beeson is interrogating his customers regarding the whereabouts of the other pieces of tusk which were evidently lost in 30 tiers of stove wood.

Elephant remains are quite common in the vicinity of Kiger Island, said Dr. Horner when interviewed, but none so well preserved has hitherto been discovered in that locality. The difference is so marked that Dr. Horner is of the opinion that the piece of ivory may have been imported by Indians or others from some other region, and was subsequently mistaken for wood and finally sold for fuel.

of disagreeable odors in the poultry house. Poultry men estimate that 100 pounds annually is ample for a flock of 60.

While odors are not as readily detected in some poultry houses as others, the same disagreeable volatile substances form in either case. The odor originates in the decomposing manure. Based on composition, poultry droppings may be three times as offensive as barn manure.

The volatile ingredients consist largely of ammonium carbonate, which may induce low vitality, disease, or low egg production. Odors also attract flies and the droppings may become the breeding places of thousands of flies.

The ingredients in agricultural gypsum interchange with ammonium carbonate, forming new combinations, none of which escape into the air. Consequently there are no ammonia odors where agricultural gypsum is properly used. Should flies deposit their eggs in the droppings, it is doubtful if they would develop, because the medium becomes unsuitable for maggot development in the presence of agricultural gypsum. The sanitary conditions in the poultry house are also greatly improved.

The ammonia prevented from escaping is the most expensive fertilizer ingredient, since it is largely nitrogen, fixed in such a way that when applied to the soil it readily becomes available to plants. Besides this, the agricultural gypsum is valuable plant food, thereby increasing the value of the manure for fertilizer purposes.

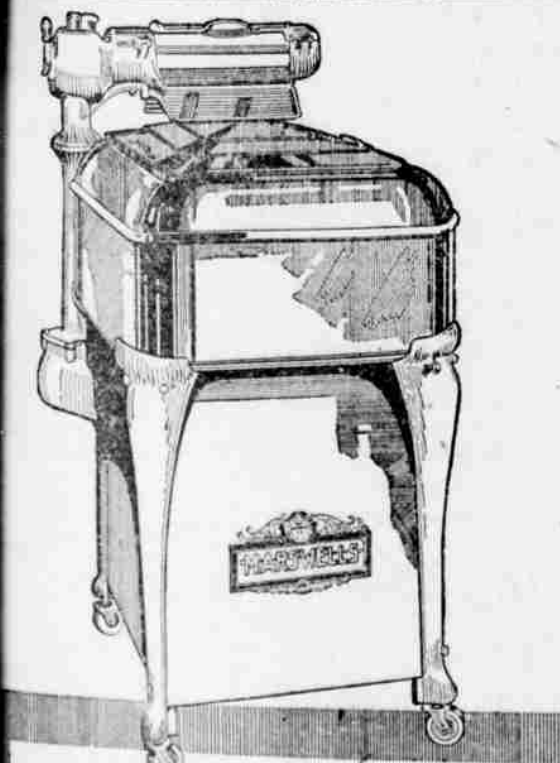
