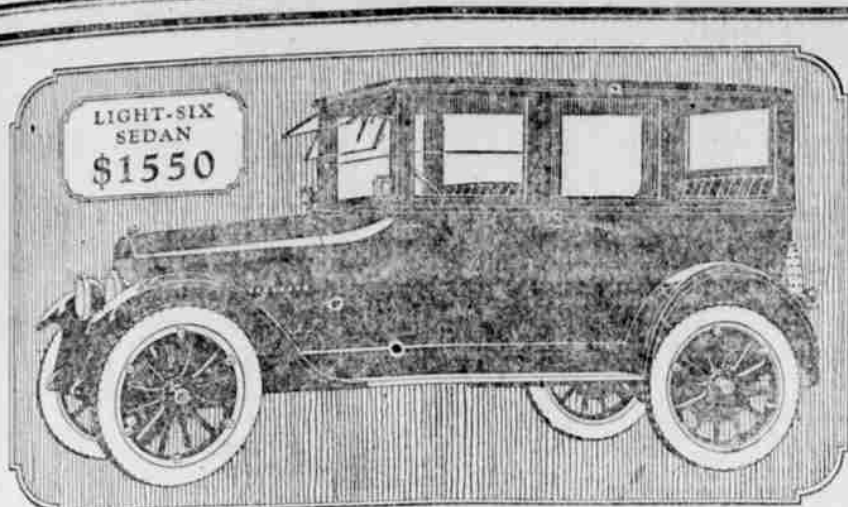

DRY CONFERENCE PLANS ANNOUNCED

Crusade for World-Wide Prohibition to Be Launched at Meeting.

RUNNERS DENOUNCED

Five Great Bodies Devoted to Suppression of The Liquor Traffic To Meet in Joint Convention in Canada.

TORONTO, Nov. 23.—(A. P.)—A world-wide crusade for prohibition will find expression in Toronto during the next five days, for some 5000 delegates have assembled here to hold an anti-alcoholic conference under the auspices of the World League against Alcoholism. They have come from no less than 22 different countries, and their purpose is to attain "by means of education and legislation, the total suppression throughout the world of alcoholism, which is the poisoning of body, germ-plasm, mind, conduct and society, produced by the consumption of alcoholic beverages."

Representatives of every known force in social reform, temperance organizations, churches, young people's societies, and Sunday schools, the gathering will mark the beginning of a new and intensified campaign against the liquor traffic, and it is expected that it will perfect complete plans for carrying on the international work. While it is being held under the auspices of the World League, the gathering will be five conventions in one—the world prohibition convention, Dominion of Canada prohibition convention, Ontario provincial prohibition convention, the World's Student Federation, and the International Enforcement Convention.

The latter convention will be attended by representatives of all the provinces of Canada, of the border states, and those particularly affected by rum-running, together with national, provincial and state enforcement officers "with a view to arriving at a mutual understanding that will end the present outrageous border situation." The slogan of the enforcement convention is: "The rum-runner must go." The convention of the Dominion Temperance Alliance will be an important one, as, aside from its relationship to the world-wide gathering, it will take steps in a new campaign for a "dry Canada," and it is promised that no effort will be spared until the manufacture, sale, importation and transportation of liquor in any part of the dominion have been made illegal by the laws of the federal and provincial parliaments.

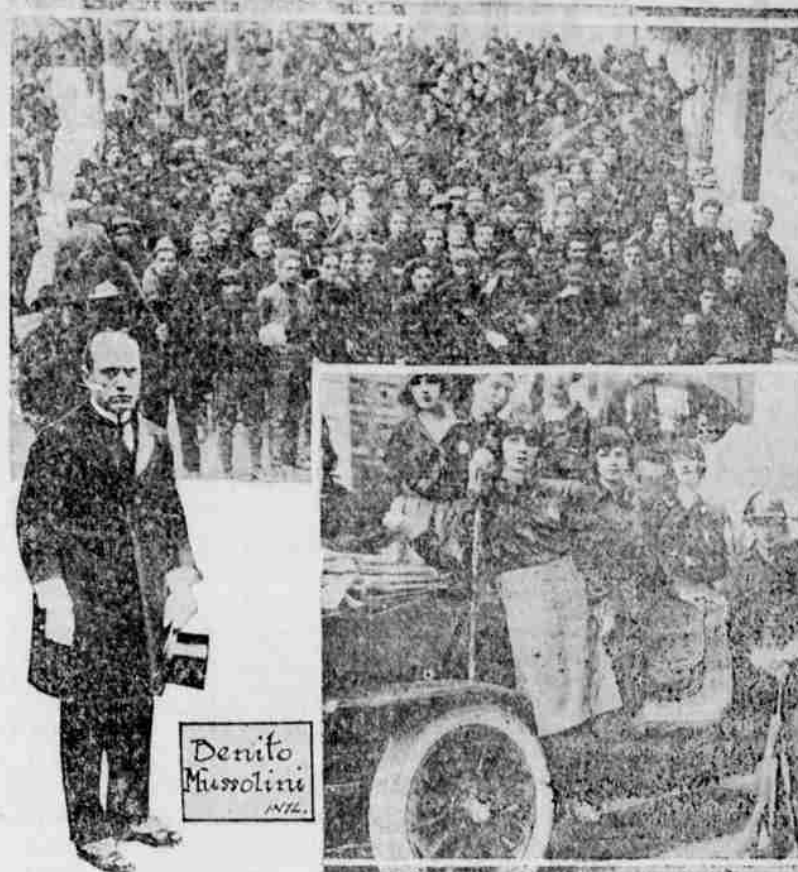
The three joint presidents of the world league, Right Hon. Lef Jones, York, England; Dr. Howard H. Russell, Westerville, O.; and Dr. Robert Horrod, Lausanne, Switzerland, will preside over the gathering alternately, and the individual conferences of the various organizations, which make up the whole, will be a charge of their respective chiefs.

In reviewing the work of the temperance forces in Canada for the suppression of the liquor traffic to a representative of the Canadian Press, Rev. Ben H. Spence, Secretary of the Dominion Temperance Alliance and host of the present convention, expressed his confidence that the object of his organization was nearing its goal. Prohibition in Canada, he said, could never be effective while liquor is legally made and transported in any part of the dominion. National prohibition could not be made safe in any nation while an adjoining nation permitted the traffic, and the campaign must be carried on with renewed vigor and energy until liquor was eradicated in every land and every clime, and the world was made safe against the ravages of alcoholism in every possible form.

"This great movement has been given to us in Canada in trust," said Mr. Spence, "and so far as our experience will be of help to others, we are by our obligations bound to give it. This convention is the biggest thing we ever put over in Canada, and the greatest the temperance advocates of the world have ever attempted. We in Canada are particularly proud that that momentous gathering was given to Canada and that Toronto was the chosen city. It is a great honor to Canada and Toronto. But after all, in the slogan of the league, 'The world is my country, and all mankind my brethren.'"

The convention seat will be at Massey Hall, and the headquarters of the league are at the King Edward Hotel. A remarkable program has been arranged for the gathering, and outstanding speakers and temperance advocates from New Zealand to Japan and from Australia to Alaska will give of their time and their expert advice to the statement of the objects in view. The list is a lengthy and comprehensive one and includes men and

women from every walk of life whose efforts have been concentrated in the interests of temperance and social uplift.

There will be sessions daily—morning, afternoon and evening—and public mass meetings will be held on the opening Sunday afternoon and Monday and Wednesday nights. It is expected that large numbers of the delegates will occupy the pulpits of Toronto churches Sunday at morning and evening services. A banquet will be tendered to the overseas delegates by the Canadian and United States delegates at the King Edward Hotel on the night of November 24.

The Women's Christian Temperance Union is holding its world and national meetings at Philadelphia during the first days of the world-wide convention, but it is expected to terminate in time to permit the delegates to attend the major part of the Toronto gathering.

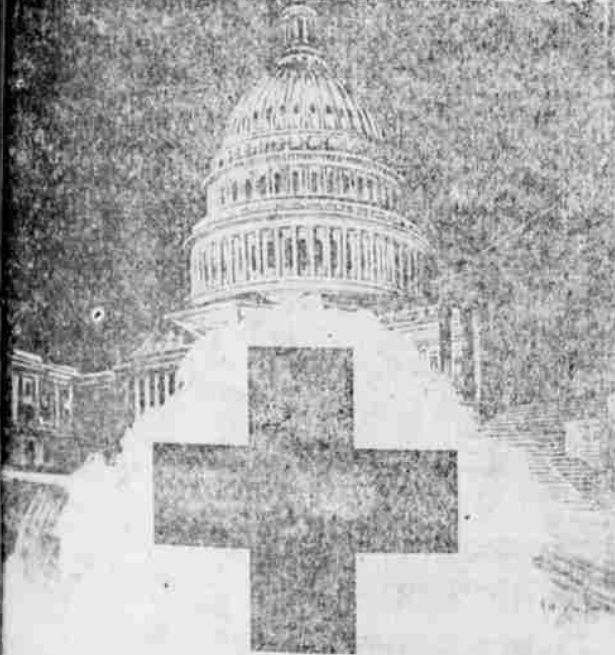
