WILL ELIMINATE VOCATIONAL HANDICAPS.

With rehabilitated war veterans of this district being placed in positions calling for an average salary of \$130 a month, the United States Veterans' Bureau in this state and the Pacific northwest is making rapid strides toward eliminating vocational handicaps imposed upon former service people by war injuries. C. C. Jesseph, northwest district manager of the bureau, has announced. Colonel Charles R. Forbes of Washington, D. C., national head of the Bureau, commended employers of this district enthusiastically for the splendid showing being made here in offering employment of rehabilitated veterans, he stated.

"More than 200 former service men who have completed training in this district have been placed on jobs since the formation of the employment service in connection with the bureau in this district August 1," said Mr. Jesseph. "During a period of two months recently, two rehabilitated veterans were placed in positions calling for salaries of \$250 a month and four secured work which will pay them \$200 a month. The next two or three months will undoubtedly be very quiet along employment lines and employers are therefore urged to contact the local office of the bureau when vacancies occur or new positions are created in order that those veterans who complete their vocational training during these months may step right into positions for which they trained."

A total of 20,980 former service persons throughout the country have been rehabilitated to date and 96,800 are now in training, it was announced. A total of 875,648 death and disability claims for compensation have been made through the Veterans' Bureau. Medical action was taken on 14,371 cases during the month of October. Nearly 7,000 new claims were filed during the same period despite the fact that the war ended more than four years ago.

It pays to give that impression.

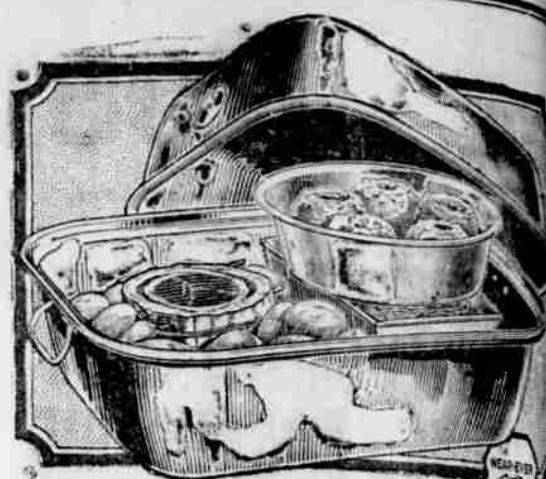

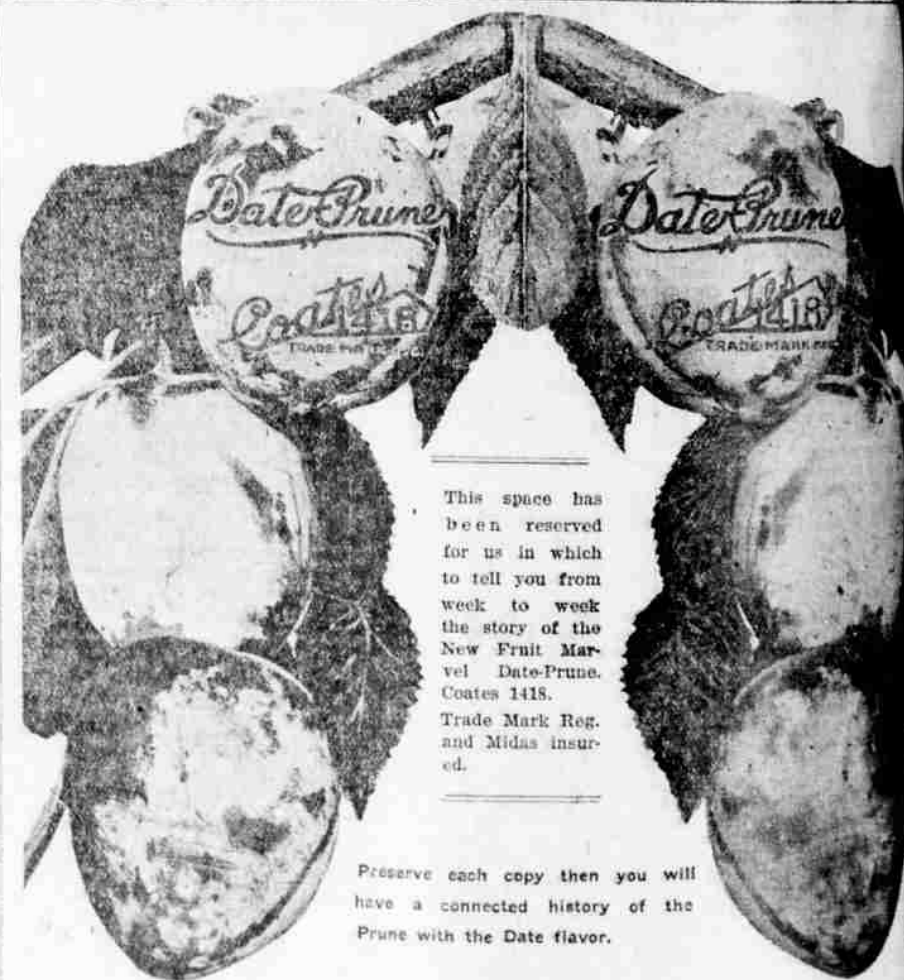
