"DESTINY'S ISLE," A ROMANCE OF MIAMI AT THE ANTLERS THEATRE

"Destiny's Isle," a Wm. P. S. Earle production, with an all-star cast, including Virginia Lee, Ward Crane, Flo Billing, George Fawcett and Arthur Housman, will be presented commencing tonight at the Antlers theatre.

The story, by Margery Land May, tells of the hurried flight of Tom Proctor (Mr. Crane) after witnessing Flo Martin (Miss Billing) in the embrace of his rival, Arthur Randall (Mr. Housman). Rendered unconscious by an accident in his flight, Tom is found in drifting boat by Lola Whitaker (Miss Lee), a girl on a neighboring island who dresses and nurses a wound on his forehead. Later, to shield this girl from unjust suspicion when Flo and her guardian (George Fawcett) find them together on the island, Tom declares the girl his wife. Flo confesses that she permitted Arthur's caress to excite Tom's jealousy. Realizing she has lost Tom, she begins to persecute the island girl, and then schemes to discredit Tom. How Lola frustrates Flo's schemes and sacrifices her happiness to defend Tom brings the drama to a pointed and highly dramatic climax.

The production was made at Miami, Fla., where the scenes are laid. The ill-fated passenger-carrying seaplane, Miss Miami, was used and is shown in many of the scenes.

"Destiny's Isle" was written by Miss Margery Land May; its production was directed by Wm. P. S. Earle, and photographed by Wm. S. Adams. J. Stuart Blackton, Jr., supervised the making of the picture. It is released by American Releasing Corporation.
