Applications for Training to Close

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 29.—A warning has been issued to former service men and women throughout the United States by Joe Sparks, chairman of the national rehabilitation committee of the American Legion, that all veterans who desire vocational training and have not made application must do so under the present law before Dec. 15, 1922.

Those who wait until after this date will forfeit their right of receiving this government training. There are several ways in which this application can be made. The claimant may make application by writing a letter expressing a desire to apply for vocational work to any one of the bureau offices located throughout the United States. It is necessary for the applicant to sign his name so that the bureau may consider the application as made by the man himself. It is advisable for the applicant to make his application in person at one of the district or sub-district offices of the U. S. Veterans' Bureau, although this is not absolutely necessary.

Forms may be obtained at any one of the bureau offices or from any of the cooperating agencies such as the American Legion, the Red Cross and other veteran organizations. These forms should be filled out, signed and forwarded to one of the veteran bureau offices. If a person is so situated that he is unable to obtain one of these forms, a letter will be accepted as an application.

Where the post mark of such letter or the form shows that it was made on or before Dec. 15, the application will be considered as where the man enters the office before the close of the working day on Dec. 15. Applications mailed later than this date will be too late.

A person who is in doubt as to whether he has a valid application on file should take steps immediately to ascertain his status from one of the offices of the bureau. The government is eager that all former service men who are entitled to the benefits of this act should take advantage of this opportunity. All applications received will have the fullest consideration and if the facts presented are sufficient to meet the provisions of the Rehabilitation Act, the claimant will be awarded the benefits provided under the law.

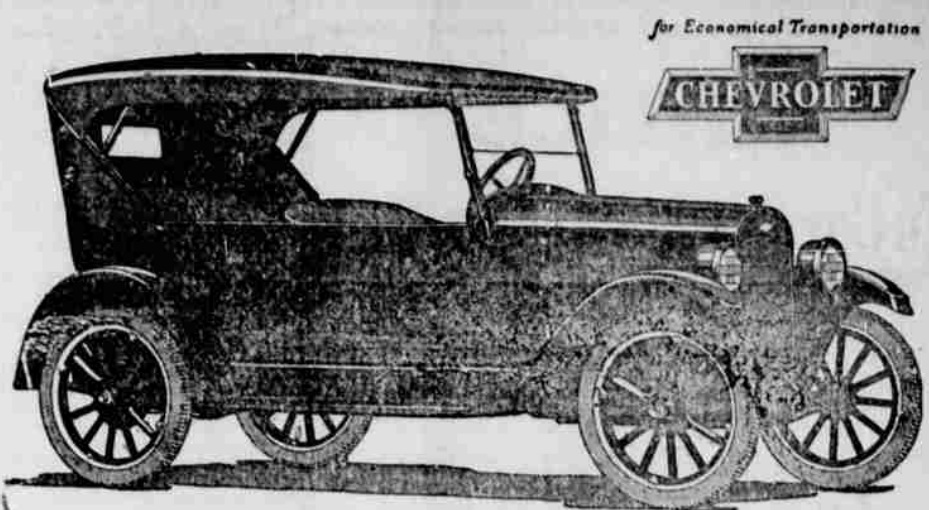
