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May Ask President to Disband Klan

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Attorney Daugherty was asked today by Senator Walsh, democrat, Montana, to consider a proposal that President Harding, after the manner of President Grant, issue a proclamation calling upon the Ku Klux Klan to disband.

Mr. Walsh sent to the attorney general a letter received from a western state declaring study of former assistant district attorney of legal practices had convinced him there was "ample authority for the president to issue a proclamation directing the Klan to disband within a certain time."

Another letter sent to the attorney general by Senator Walsh was from a leading attorney in Texas, who enumerated a large number of outrages in Texas alleged to have been committed by members of the Klan, including 500 bar parties and whipping bees, not to mention a number of homicides, assaults and other offenses directed against the persons.

The writer said that so far as he knew "none of those responsible for the outrages had been brought to justice," and asserted that in so many of the counties and cities of the state the officials all belong to the organization.

Salem Boy Is Killed by Pal

SALEM, Nov. 28.—Today officials were investigating circumstances surrounding the case of 14-year-old Archie Sanford of Salem, who was fatally wounded when a 12-gauge shotgun, carried by his companion, Robert Turley, was accidentally discharged while the two boys were hunting just south of the Salem city limits.

Although young Sanford died at the Salem Deaconess hospital Sunday evening, authorities did not learn of the accident until last night, when they were informed indirectly from Portland. Newspapers here were not informed of the story, but chanced upon it this morning.

A preliminary survey conducted by officials that the shooting undoubtedly was an accident, but they were inclined to feel that some negligence had been shown in the failure to report the case.

Sanford, it was said, was only a few feet from Turley when he was shot in the hip. The latter, watching for game, had been crawling through the underbrush, there upon trailing, when the trigger of Turley's gun became caught in the brush and the gun discharged. Sanford was in the line.

Sanford was evacuated from the Lincoln Junior high school last night and had recently become an apprentice at the T. M. Barry furniture shop on South Commercial street.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter C. Sanford, 508 South Ninth street. Young Turley resides on Fairview avenue.

NO AID FOR SHIPS CARRYING LIQUORS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—(U. P.)—The house today adopted an amendment to the ship subsidy bill which, if it becomes a law, will prohibit any vessel from receiving government financial aid on any voyage when intoxicating liquors are included in the cargo or by individuals aboard with the knowledge of anyone in authority on the vessel.

The amendment was adopted by a vote of 249 to 177. It was introduced by Representative Clegg of California.

The amendment will apply to all ships receiving government financial aid, whether they are carrying passengers or cargo.

The amendment will also apply to ships carrying liquor for the purpose of sale to the public.
