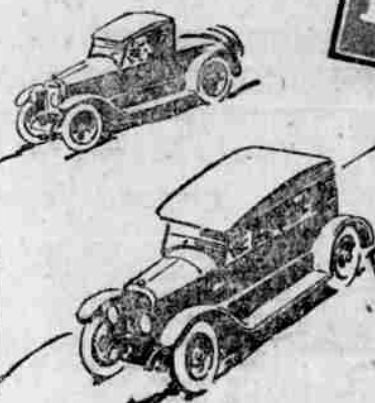

LETTER AUTO LICENSE LAW

Time has come for the people to get a fairer and more satisfactory automobile license law. Everywhere I go I hear dissatisfaction expressed with the present license law. It is eminently fair to the man of modest means, but a second-hand car of medium or heavy weight for light use, probably only running it one to three thousand miles a year, yet at present he pays such license on his car that him \$500 dollars as another with a new car that cost him times that much and probably the highways five times as much at a much greater speed. It is only one of many cases of this kind that might be cited. The license law to be just should be arranged to tax a man according to the amount he uses the highways. The present law does not do this. My plan is to charge a nominal fee, say an average of around

\$10, and then increase the gasoline tax enough so that the gasoline consumed by the citizens of Oregon would at least make up the deficit, then the tax on the gas used by tourists would greatly increase the funds available for road construction. Probably an increase of four cents per gallon on the present gas tax would be sufficient.

I believe that a gas tax up to ten cents per gallon, wisely spent in permanent road construction, would be an investment and not a luxury. To illustrate what I mean: On a recent trip I toured through North Dakota and Montana over

the Roosevelt Trail or highway. The muddy condition of part of the roads made going so hard that I would gladly have paid one dollar for gasoline if by so doing I could have had paved roads to travel.

Our mileage of paved roads is now sufficient so that no fair-minded tourist will object to a reasonable gas tax.

I realize that certain difficulties attend the proper functioning of such a law, foremost of which is the competition along the state borders from dealers outside of our state who can undersell the Oregon dealer and divert the business to

other states where the tax is not so high. This difficulty could be overcome to a very large extent if the Washington legislature could be induced to pass a similar law. The other borders probably would not give serious trouble. Failing to secure co-operation from Washington, some other plan might be devised to overcome this difficulty.

If we got much more money for road construction in the near future, we must show the taxpayers that the people who use the roads must pay for them.

TURKEY MARKET AT SAN FRANCISCO COLLAPSES

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 30.—The state market commission reported a "demoralized turkey market" today owing to unusually heavy receipts and a late demand. As a result the "best dressed" varieties were quoted at 24 to 26 cents a pound wholesale, and from 39 to 42 cents retail.

Approximately eight carloads of Oregon turkeys were received here, and to this overflowing market was added the usual big California receipts. The rail receipts alone up to noon today were 475 tons. Yesterday retail prices of turkeys ranged from 55 cents in the downtown markets to 60 cents in shops in the residence districts.

Roseburg Loses To Grants Pass

The Roseburg high school football team was defeated in a hard fought contest at Grants Pass yesterday, the score being 12 to 7. The two teams were evenly matched and fought a gruelling contest on a wet and slippery field upon which the snow was falling for a greater part of the game.

Roseburg lost the contest on a fluke play in which a fumble cost a touchdown. Grants Pass punted and it appeared that the ball would cross the goal line. If it had crossed the Roseburg team would have been privileged to carry it out to the 20 yard line. However, it stopped rolling about two inches short. A Roseburg player grabbed the ball and started to run and was tackled hard. The pignin slipped from his fingers and rolled over the line and was confiscated by a Grants Pass player scoring the winning touchdown.
