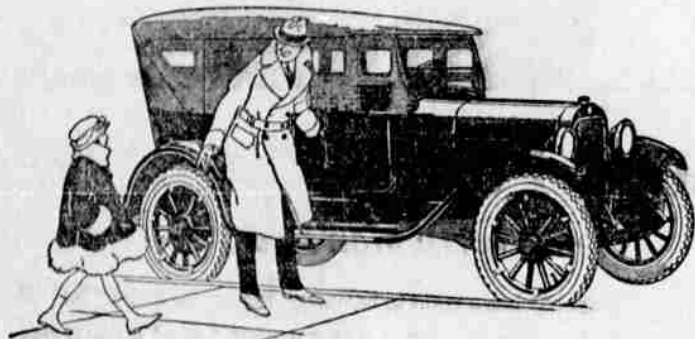

REACH SALONIKI

SALONIKI, Dec. 6.—One thousand tons of supplies for the relief of refugees from Turkey have been unloaded here recently, and will help care for the needy until the arrival of the American Red Cross shipments from the United States. The unloading was done under the direction of R. M. Davidson, of Ashland, Kentucky, local representative of the Near East Relief.

At Kavalla a committee of American tobacco men have done heroic work in the distributing of refugee supplies.

At Dedagatch Doctor W. V. M. Wright, of Philadelphia, is directing the American relief effort.
