Toreador Trousers Not Accounted For

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 6. (United Press)—The why and the wherefore of Peon Pants are questions which no local psychologists have so far attempted to answer. Callow youth will have its way, and a fad is a fad, is the best rooks hereabouts can do in the way of an explanation.

Of late youths of about the ages of 16 to 18 have been appearing at Portland high schools with their nether limbs clad in green corduroy with belled bottoms. A sash frequently encases a slender waist, and here and there one sees the belled bottoms slit and pearl buttons glinting playfully at the edge of said slit.

Not all the youths of upper high school age affected the fad, and hence controversy has arisen. In a number of instances at high schools here and elsewhere in the state frate fellow students have forcibly seized the wearer and as forcibly removed the offensive garments. But the toreador youths have maintained a steadfast stand in the face of displeasure, and as Byron stuck with his soft collar in the face as starched neckerchief in old England.

At Franklin high school here recently open warfare was threatened unless the "wearing of the green" was stopped. The faculty interfered and the pants are still in evidence.

One sees them on downtown streets as well as on high school campuses. A similar situation obtained at other high schools. At Albany and Pendleton youths were rendered hors de combat and left shivering in out-houses while their erstwhile gay attire graced the heights of trees and telephone poles.

Criticism as well as the brilliant sash prevents the peon fad from falling and, in Oregon at least, it appears here to stay.

Students Will Get Credit for Drill

SALEM, Dec. 6.—Service in the Oregon national guard, if accompanied by the requisite attendance at drills and camp, will hereafter be credited as one of the 15 units toward graduation from a standard high school, according to announcement by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction. Churchill is advising school superintendents in all cities containing guard units of this decision to recognize guard service as a factor in the education of the boys of Oregon.

In order to earn his unit for guard service it will be necessary for the student to attend drills regularly and meet the requirements of the 15-day annual training camp throughout his four years' high school course. All attendance must be certified to by the captain of the company, based upon the federal drill attendance returns upon which the United States treasury pays the men.

EXHAUSTED LAND BIRDS FIND HAVEN AT SEA

LIVERPOOL, Dec. 6.—Thousands of American land birds, blown out to sea by unfavorable winds, sought safety on the decks of the Cunard liner Scythia on her last trip from New York, and stayed on board until she docked in Liverpool. When misfortune overtook the feathered travelers they were migrating, probably from the north Atlantic states to the warm lands bordering on the Caribbean. Now many of them again are free, but in England, thousands of miles from their destination, and those supposed to be wise in bird lore have not yet been able to give satisfactory answers to the questions of interested passengers as to whether the birds would still endeavor to reach their summer haunts in the West Indies, or join the robins and innets of England in their winter flight to southern France and northern Africa.

The great flock, several thousand in number, settled on the Scythia's decks when the steamer was about 400 miles from the American shore, and transformed her into a floating aviary. Wild canaries, robins, innets, thrushes, sand pipers and juncos, fluttered around the decks, perched on the rigging, and even penetrated the lounges and engine room. The passengers and crew cared for them, giving them warmth, food and shelter, but even so many of the smaller birds died from exhaustion. Three owls and a score of pigeons were easily captured.

Old sea travelers say they never have known birds to alight before in such large numbers on a single ship.

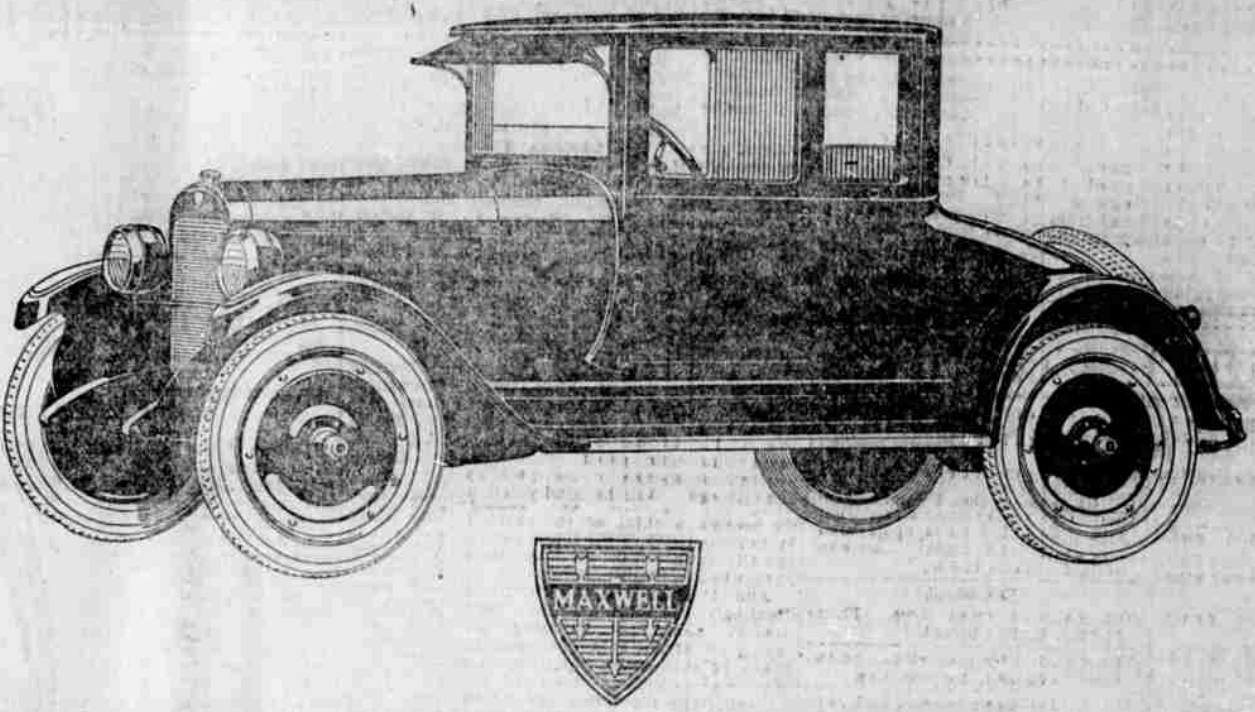
