PINEAPPLES MAY REPLACE SUGAR AS CHIEF HAWAIIAN CROP

HONOLULU, T. H., Dec. 13.—The possibility that pineapples shortly may challenge the ancient supremacy of sugar cane as Hawaii's premier crop is seen in the announcement that the islands' gross income this year from pineapples will be about \$22,000,000, as compared with the sugar crop value of \$21,500,000. New acreage and improved methods in cultivation are expected to increase the pineapple production by at least fifty and perhaps 100 percent within a few years.

The production of canned pineapples this year approximated 5,000,000 cases, which sold at an average price of \$4.25 a case. The acreage is estimated at 36,000, which will be increased next year because the packers have been unable to supply the demand.

Chief among the improvements in cultivating methods is the utilization of the newly discovered paper mulching process which has increased production on certain lands by between 25 and 30 percent in experiments conducted this year.

Stanford has always been strong in the sprints and next year will be no exception for a new runner, Marshall Hale has been discovered. Four watches last week timed Hale at 9 and 4-5 seconds in the 100 yard run and 21 2-5 seconds in the 220.

Hale was on the squad last year but did not place on account of a pulled tendon. In addition to Hale there is a possibility that Eddie Sud, crack Cardinal sprint man of 1922, will return to college after the Christmas vacation. Bob Wright also will run the sprints.

For the first time in several years the Cardinal team will have good distance men. Three runners, Al Charles, Murphy and Elliott, being out for the long runs. Last year Elliott, after two weeks of training, took third in the two-mile run against California.

Then there will be Glen Harcraft, national intercollegiate champion in the shot and discus and dangerous man in the sprints. Al Smith, a sophomore, who holds the Stanford-California freshmen record for this distance and also holds the Stanford practice record. Charles Daley, who won the half last year, against California, also will be back. "Blink" Williamson and Van Zeeah will run the 440-yard event and Lane Falk and Leisner will be in the hurdles. Two years ago, in a national meet, Falk ran second only to Krogness, the Harvard star.

Bill Black will be in the pole vault. Stanford is weak only in the jumps and the javelin. If Righttetti comes back, the weakness in the javelin will be removed.

In the Stanford-California meet last year—a bitterly contested affair—the Cards and Bears fought to a tie.

He waited awhile at a neighbor's and then entered through a bedroom window, finding the house filled with gas, his wife on a cot in the kitchen, the children on the floor and gas pouring from an open stove burner. The officers said that the circumstances indicated that the mother, who had been ill, turned on the gas.

George Bohler, now starting his third year as basketball coach, has seven lettermen numbered among the huge squad of varsity candidates. While he is not promising a championship five, he declared the Oregon team this season will be much stronger than it was last year.

Lettermen back this season are, Latham, Alstock, Edlunds, Goar, Burnett, Coach, Zimmerman and Haddon. Rockney, a letterman of last year, will join the squad with the opening of the winter term. Bill Spear, giant end of the varsity football team, and Hall Chapman, quarterback, are among the likely looking aspirants for the five. But three men, Marc Latham, Boller and Andre, of last year's varsity squad are missing this season.

Bohler has a barnstorming trip planned for the Christmas holidays at which time he will take a tentative varsity squad on a tour of the Willamette valley and northwestern and northeastern parts of the state.

YOUNGER OFFICIALS PROPOSE NEW HOME FOR PRINCE REGENT

TOKIO, Dec. 13.—The younger officials of the Household department are advocating a plan to make the Akasaka detached palace, where the Prince of Wales resided a permanent dwelling for the Prince Regent. They propose to remodel this palace along lines similar to Buckingham palace, appropriating half of it for the Regent's use and the other half for reception of guests. A Japanese building would be added for Princess Nagako and her attendants.

The older officials think that although the Palace was intended by Emperor Meiji for the Crown Prince, the Masunigaseki Palace, where the Regent now lives, is more suited to his wishes for simplicity and example of economy to the people.
