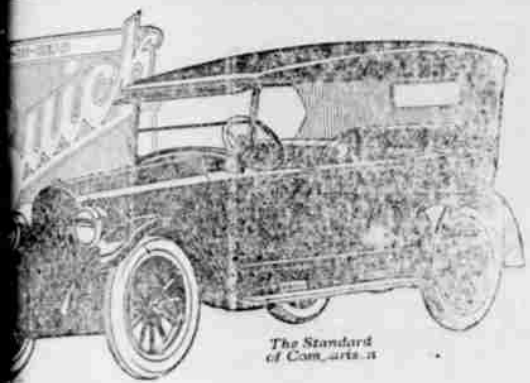

FERRY PASSENGERS HAVE SANTA CLAUS

OAKLAND, Dec. 23.—Nothing daunted by the fact that the famous redeemer of the Santa Claus special are supposed to travel only on the land and through the air, the commuters who daily travel from here to San Francisco on the 7:20 a. m. ferry boat this morning celebrated Christmas with Santa himself on hand while the boat nosed her way across the waters of the bay.

The celebration, planned weeks ahead by the regular passengers on that trip, included a program of talks and musical numbers. The feature of the celebration was the arrival of Santa Claus who clambered aboard over the side of the ship as the ferry approached Goat Island. The ceremony was reminiscent of the way Father Neptune boards a ship when it

crosses the equator and enters his domain.

This morning's special celebration was not the first that the ferry passengers of the 7:20 ferry have staged. The personnel of the passengers on this ferry is nearly the same every morning and has assumed almost the atmosphere of an exclusive club.

FERRY LIVES NEEDED BY U. S. RAILROADS IN ALASKA

(By Associated Press.)

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Dec. 23.—Ferry lines are needed by the U. S. Government railroad in Alaska, according to General Wiles P. Richardson, who as representative of Secretary of the Interior Fall, made an inspection tour of the road.

Paid spur tracks and wagon roads, according to the general, would result in development of the mineral and arid land which lies adjacent to the railroad. Eventually the government must adapt a colonization plan for Alaska, General Richardson said, so that the country can be settled and fully developed.
