

MONTEREY FOLKS REAL BOOSTERS

MONTEREY, Calif., Jan. 1.—Did you receive a postal card from here last week? If you have a friend here in Monterey the chances are that you did. The week that ended yesterday was officially designated here as post-card week. During the seven days all residents of the city were asked to send messages to their friends in commemoration of the landing of Vasco on Monterey Peninsula, December 10, 1602.

It was suggested that the commemoration cards bear a fitting inscription much like this:
"In commemoration of the landing of Don Sebastian Viscaino in the Monterey Peninsula on December 10, 1602, which event transpired 18 years before the landing of the Pilgrims on Plymouth Rock, and eight years before the founding of Jamestown, I send you this greeting from the Monterey Peninsula site of the first Capital of California, cradle of his most beautiful portion of all California."

Many will doubtless disagree with the last part of the statement while they applaud the idea of commemorating an important event in California history.

SOME ROAD BOND MONEY IS LEFT

**Over Four Hundred Thousand
Dollars Still Remain in
Project Balances**

FEW ARE OVERDRAWN

**Large Share of Fund Will Be
Expended in Cooperation
With State in Finishing
Two Main Highways**

Douglas county still has approximately \$475,000 of unexpended bond money, according to the last audit of the bond funds, made on December

11. The great amount of work done with the bonds voted in 1921 has resulted in the greater part of that fund being expended. There still remains, however, \$443,000 from the \$1,100,000 bond issue which the voters of the county authorized in 1921, and \$27,000 in the 1917 bond fund.

Of the 1921 fund the balance remains on the Pacific highway and Coos Bay highway projects and the Elkton-Reedsport project. There still remains more than \$91,000 to be expended on the road to Coos county, while \$22,999 remains in the fund to pay for bridges, overhauls and rights-of-way on the Pacific highway. There is also the sum of \$101,539 yet to be expended from this bond issue on the Elkton-Reedsport road, in addition to \$21,000 for the Rochester Bridge-Elkton road. There are also several roads in the southern part of the county near Glendale and Riddle yet to receive money from this fund.

In the 1917 bonds there remain eighteen unfinished projects on which money is still to be expended. A large part of this amount is to be spent on the Roseburg-Dixonville and Dixonville-Carnes road.

At the time these bonds were voted the voters specified exactly how the money should be spent, specifying the various projects and the sum to be expended on each. The court has followed this schedule and at the present time the balance existing in each of the projects is as follows:

PERPETUAL YOUTH

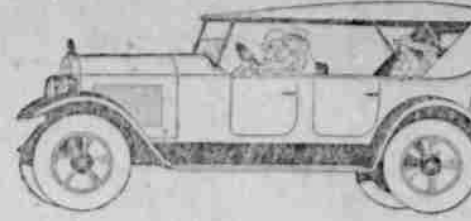


TIME, to be ever young, is born again

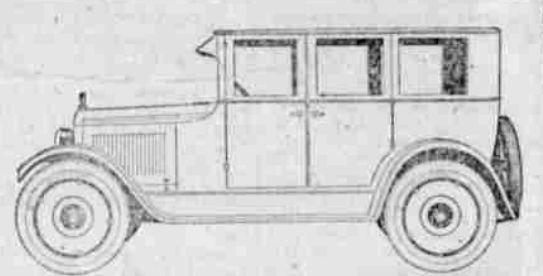
