BIG STRIKES MARKED U. S. IN PAST YEAR

New York, Jan. 1.—The outstanding purely domestic features of 1922 in this country were the coal and rail strikes. Of these the coal strike was the more important, as it was and is acutely felt by practically the whole country.

Thousands of people are now suffering from the lack of fuel, and, according to authorities, no immediate relief is in sight. The rail strike, with the consequent weakening of transportation facilities is in part responsible for the present coal condition.

After numerous negotiations had failed the miners suspended operations on April 1. They demanded a raise in wages and the operators threatened a cut. The strike affected 160,000 miners, 260 collieries and 55 companies. Many casualties resulted from battles between the miners and bands of strike breakers, the greatest tragedy being the Herrin massacre, in which 20 men lost their lives.

The miners and the operators reached an agreement in Philadelphia on Sept. 2, which was signed in Scranton on Sept. 9. Operations were resumed on Sept. 11. The agreement is to hold for one year. Although their demands were not granted, the miners claim a victory, because their wages were not cut.

The rail strike began on July 1, when nearly all of the 460,000 union

rail shopmen walked out. Troops were called out in various parts of the country to quell disorders, and travel was completely tied up in many sections.

One of the features of the early part of the strike was the marooning of 12 transcontinental trains with 2,500 passengers in the Arizona desert. Several pitched battles were fought and dozens of bridges burned.

The year was also marked by many disasters. In major wrecks and air crashes, 155 people were killed. In mine accidents, storms and floods 261 more lost their lives.

The Argonaut mine disaster in which 47 men died on August 27 was one of the most sensational. Sixty died in one hurricane in New York on June 11, and 63 in the Texas floods on April 25.

The principle deaths were: Major General James William McAndrew, on May 1, at the age of 60; Henry P. Davidson, banker and philanthropist, on May 6; 81 years; Lieut. Belvin W. Maynard, the "Flying Parson," on Sept. 7; John Wanamaker, merchant prince, on Dec. 12.

LEGISLATURE MEETS MONDAY

The state legislature meets next Monday, January 8, at which time Governor-Elect Pierce will be inaugurated and will take over the office of Governor. The members of the Douglas County delegation to the legislature are preparing to leave for Salem the last of the week. A number of important measures are to be considered at this time and the county delegation is looking forward to a very busy time.

YONCALLA, Ore., Dec. 29.—The country home of Mr. and Mrs. Dave Kinney was the scene of a very pretty wedding at 5:30 Friday evening when Miss Mary Huntington, a sister of Mrs. Kinney, and Mr. Benjamin H. Nichols, were united in marriage.

The bride was daintily gowned in a travelling dress of blue canton crepe, ornamented in gold. Until four years ago she made her home in Yoncalla but since that time has resided in Corvallis, where she has been attending the Oregon Agricultural College from which she graduated this December.

Mr. Nichols graduated from the college in 1919 and, after a special course in an eastern institution has been employed in the school of electrical engineering at the O. A. C.

The house was tastefully decorated in mistletoe and holiday greenery, which furnished the appropriate setting for the event. The ring ceremony was used, the Rev. J. R. Benton, of the Methodist Episcopal church, of Yoncalla, officiating. There were no guests. After the ceremony the family sat down to a bountiful spread, after which the young couple set out for their new home in Corvallis. Change in World Rulers 1922

This year, 1922, witnessed the toppling of two thrones and several normal or automatic changes of rulership.

Greece expelled King Constantine, September 27, as the result of a military revolt (due to the collapse of the Greek army in Asia Minor). Although a revolutionary committee remains in control, George II (son of Constantine) was placed on the throne.

Turkey (as represented by Kemalist assembly at Angora) expelled Sultan Mohammed VI, and abolished the sultanate, November 19, Abdul Mejid (son of former Sultan Abdul-Aziz), was elected caliph, or religious head of the Mohammedan world.

Two new states came into being.

Egypt, on March 15, was transformed from a British protectorate into an independent country, with Ahmed Fuad (former sultan) as king.

The Irish Free State commenced life as a self-governing British dominion, December 6, with Timothy M. Healy as governor general and William Cosgrave as president of Dail Eireann (premier).

China, as the result of a long-drawn internal struggle, elected (June 11) a new president—Li Yuan-hung.

Monaco saw a change of rulership, Prince Louis succeeding to the throne June 26, on the death of Prince Albert.

New presidents were elected, according to constitutions: in Argentina, Dr. Marcelo de Alvear; Brazil, Dr. Arthur da Silva Bernardes; Colombia, General Pedro Nel Ospina; Haiti, Louis Borno.

The Roman Catholic world suffered a great loss by the death (January 22) of Pope Benedict XV. He was succeeded by Cardinal Ratti, who was elected sovereign pontiff under the style of Pius XI, February 6.

1922 UPHEAVALS IN POLITICAL ARENA

Political upheavals of a domestic nature occurred in most of the leading European countries in 1922, the most unexpected being the overthrow of David Lloyd George in England, and perhaps the most significant the near-revolutionary assumption of power of the Fascist, headed by Signor Mussolini, in Italy.

In England Lloyd George was driven from office after seven years premiership as the result of a revolt of the Conservative wing of his coalition government. He resigned October 19 and was succeeded three days later by Andrew Bonar Law, Conservative leader. At the ensuing general election, November 15, Bonar Law's party was returned to power by a substantial majority, Lloyd George having but a remnant of his party left.

Italy had two cabinet crises before the advent of Mussolini. First Premier Bonomi resigned in February, endeavored to form a new cabinet, but eventually gave way to Signor Luigi Facta. The Facta cabinet got into trouble in the late summer, resigned and endeavored to reform. After the country had been practically without a government for over a fortnight the militant Fascist took charge, marched on Rome in what was the most remarkable "constitutional revolution" in Europe's history, and forced the appointment of their leader Benito Mussolini as premier.

France had a political crisis as the result of the Cannes conference and Premier Aristide Briand was hurried from office, being succeeded by ex-President Raymond Poincare.

Germany, after a troubled political life under Premier Wirth eventually changed governments in November, Wirth being succeeded by the shipping magnate Cuno, as premier.

Greece had numerous political crises which culminated in the overthrow of King Constantine, the impeachment and execution of three ex-premiers, two other ministers and a

general, by the revolutionary committee. Spain passed a troubled political year. Premier Allende-Salazar, being succeeded by Senor Sanchez Guerra, who resigned but, accepted the premiership again December 2. Portugal's year resulted in the overthrow of several cabinets, and two revolutionary outbreaks, which, however, were not of international importance.
