E COUNTY CUTS SIX OFF PAYROLL

Thousands of Dollars Lopped Off
Budget When Six Employees
Are Relieved of
Duties

SENE, Jan. 3.—Six county employees were discharged and more \$12,000 lopped off the county budget at the first meeting of the county court this afternoon. The commissioners declared that by way to reduce taxes was to them, and on motion of Commissioner E. E. Sharp the following were discharged:

P. Whitney, county agricultural salary \$2,000.
McKee, county road master, \$2,700.
W. McArthur, county bridge attendant, salary \$2,000.
Sally Craighill, county health salary \$2,400.
J. Swan, rural school superintendent, salary \$1,500.
J. Young, head court house janitor, \$1,400.

County court, on motion, took up and firing of county road men out of Judge C. P. Barnard's hands and left the sole matter of road and bridge construction and repair in the commissioners' hands. This was done, according to the resolution passed, because the county judge had probate matters which took up his time. All other county business outside of roads were to be acted upon by the full county court.

BLIND EDITOR HAS EXCELLENT RECORD

POPLAR BLUFF, Mo., Jan. 2.—Dwight H. Brown, president of the Missouri Press association, edits a local daily newspaper chiefly with his ears and memory.

Session Is Short.

The session of the court which made the most radical change in county administration lasted but a few minutes. The motions made by Commissioner Sharp and seconded by Commissioner Nels Roney, the new member of the court, were passed with Judge Barnard dissenting.

The county commissioners announced that it is their intention to cut down expenses wherever they can. The firing of the six county employees makes a big start toward the 10 per cent cut in county expenses authorized by the taxpayers' meeting to be applied on payment of \$100,000 in outstanding warrants matching the half mill voted for this purpose.

Budget Saved \$7,340.

The general county expense budget as presented to the taxpayers, however, will benefit only \$7,340, as the county roadmaster's salary of \$2,700 and bridge superintendent's \$2,000 had been left off the budget. This was done because both Mr. Sharp and Mr. Roney had announced their intention to handle these two departments themselves and the latter had made his campaign on this issue.

County Agent Whitney has been with the county for three years. The state and federal government furnish about 50 per cent of his salary and expenses and the county 40 per cent. By doing away with the office the county loses about \$3,000 in match money spent here in advancing agricultural work.

Swan Employed for Three Years.

Assistant School Superintendent Swan has been employed by the county for three years. Previously, the four supervisor system was used in the county. Three years ago the four supervisors, employed at \$120 a month, were done away with by the county superintendent and one assistant appointed.

Roadmaster McKee and Bridge Superintendent McArthur have been in the county employ six or seven years.

SAYS HORNS ON PHONOGRAPHS NOT BEST FOR CONDENSING

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Jan. 2.—Horns used on telephones and phonographs are not of the most efficient shape for the condensing of sound, in the opinion of Dr. A. L. Foley, head of the department of physics and a research professor at Indiana university.

Dr. Foley said he disagrees with the popular theory that sound comes through horns as water goes through a funnel. He declares that most of the energy backs out of horns instead of being condensed at the small end.

The Indiana university scientist has designed several new types of horns in accordance with his theory.

New Motion Picture Idea.

A motion picture projector which can be used by anybody, anywhere, making possible the projection of moving pictures under all conditions, is in use in France. The lantern and film reels of the projector are supported above an upright triangular frame, at right angles to which is a second triangular frame supporting a seat and a large pulley driven by pedals. Behind the large pulley is a dynamo which supplies current for a high-powered incandescent lamp. By means of belts the pedaled pulley operates the dynamo, the projector and the film reels all simultaneously.—Popular Science Magazine.

GASOLINE TAX BEFORE INDIANA LAWMAKERS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 3.—A gasoline tax of two cents per gallon, an increase ranging from 50 to 100 percent in automobile license fees through consideration of proposed plans for improving education, appropriation of \$1,000,000 to continue the new reformatory building program, and general economy in appropriations, are included in the program which Governor McCray is expected to present to the legislature, which convenes tomorrow. Tax legislation, as a purely partisan measure may be introduced by the democrats, whose platform favored "home rule" in control over tax levies and bond issues. Governor McCray and other republican leaders believe such authority should remain with the state tax board.

The closeness of republican and democratic division in the legislature precludes the passage of a great amount of purely partisan measures. The senate has 33 republicans and 18 democrats and the house 52 republicans and 48 democrats. At caucuses held by democratic leaders and the minority members of both houses, any intention of obstructing the republican program, was disclaimed, although all majority measures will be closely scrutinized. The democrats charged extravagance in reformatory construction work during the campaign.

A discussion of the primary law has been held by both parties and Governor McCray is quoted favoring repeal of those sections relating to presidential candidates. There is, however, a divided sentiment among the legislators, some favoring repeal or amendment of the measure, others demanding that it remain intact.

The gasoline tax and increased automobile license fees are generally favored with a division as to the disposition of the increased revenue. Many members of both parties have expressed themselves as believing the money should be devoted to highway construction, the direct highway tax be abolished, and that the increased fees be not used to provide additional general revenue.

Attorney R. L. Eddy left yesterday evening for Portland where he remained over today attending to business matters. He will return to Roseburg tomorrow morning. Senator Eddy expects to leave Saturday for Salem to take his place in the state legislature. He is deadlocked with Senator Upton over the presidency of the senate and an interesting election is expected, although dopesters at present give Upton an edge of two votes.
