COTTON BRINGS PROSPERITY TO SOUTHEASTERN MISSOURI

CAPE GIRARDEAU, Mo., Jan. 2.—

Wealth and prosperity is being thrust upon southeast Missouri—a region once considered as barren as the sandy wastes of the desert.

Towns are teeming with incoming hundreds, seeking the fortunes of a new El Dorado. A boom is on, money is plentiful, banks are keeping open doors until late hours in the night to handle the surge of currency.

No gold mines; no oil wells—only waving fields of fleecy cotton are responsible for the prosperity that has developed the region.

Once cut off from the rest of the world by a swampy, sterile tract of land and peopled by poor farmers, the country has been drained and cultivated until now it is recognized as one of the most fertile regions in the middle west.

Corn was tried first and then wheat. Neither met with much success. Then their neighbors to the south complained of the ravages of the boll weevil. Arkansas cotton was below par. There was a market for good cotton.

Came a land owner who declared Missouri should meet the demand. A

crop was tried with surprising success. Others followed, with equally good success.

This year, land owners and tenants in 13 southeast Missouri counties made \$18,728,000 on their cotton crop. Practically all their earnings were reaped between September 1 and December 1. More than 150,000 bales of cotton from their fields were ginned in the state. Flushed with the arrival of their high tide of wealth, more land is being cleared, large tracts are being cut up into tenant farms, the soil is being nurtured for next year's crop.

One bank was forced to keep open until midnight to accept all the deposits that were being thrust into its vaults. One country storekeeper collected \$5,000 in bank checks in one day. Old financial scores are being settled between neighbors; mortgages are lifted; banks are finding it difficult to prevent customers from paying off their loans.

Completion of several large drain-irrigation systems, notably the Little River system, already finished, and the Inter-River system, still under way, will add several hundred thousand acres of ideal cotton land to the area available for the crop.

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AMERICAN SURGEONS TO TOUR S. AMERICA

CHICAGO, Jan. 2.—Promotion of professional and social relations between the surgeons of Central and South America and members of the American College of Surgeons which it is hoped, will lead to an exchange of professors and students between colleges of surgery in the various countries, is the purpose of an extended tour to South America of members of the college. Approximately 350 members and their families will make the trip. The steamer Vandyck has been especially chartered, and will leave New York February 10.

"This is to be a strictly cultural invasion," said Dr. Franklin Martin, director general of the college, "and not a commercial expedition. We will hold a series of scientific meetings in the principal South American capitals and study the medical schools, hospitals and institutions of those countries which have their own peculiar problems."

The trip is the result of visits made to South America by Dr. William J. Mayo, of Rochester, Mass., and Dr. Martin, in 1920, and Dr. Thomas J. Watkins and Dr. Martin, in 1921. Return visits have been made by a number of eminent South American surgeons, which aroused sufficient interest among fellows of the college to create a popular demand for a formal visit. Surgeons from every state in the Union and from every province in Canada will be in the party.

"It is our intention to extend the jurisdiction of the American College of Surgeons to every country in South America," says Dr. Martin.

"Included in the party will be a group of professors from the leading colleges of medicine and surgery, who will visit the South American institutions. A student in surgery in those countries must now have two years foreign experience. At present the majority go to European schools to complete their course. It will be one of our objects to have these students come to the United States, where equal facilities and opportunities abound, to take their foreign course."

The members of the party will be entertained by the president of Cuba and the medical men of Havana, and at Colon, Panama, they will assist in laying the cornerstone of the institute of Tropical Medicine which is to be a memorial to General Gorgas.

From Colon, the party will go to Cartagena, Colombia, where a 160 hour stop will be made. La Guayra, Venezuela, also will be visited. In both places elaborate plans have been made by the profession to entertain the visitors with sightseeing tours, special entertainments, and a visit to the medical schools.

The party will next make a brief stop at Pernambuco, Brazil, with Rio de Janeiro the chief objective. The hospitals, medical colleges, and other places of scientific interest at Rio de Janeiro will be inspected before leaving for Buenos Aires and Montevideo.

A number of the tourists are planning to return home by way of the west coast of South America.

They have plenty of supplies and plenty of fuel, and their camps and mines will be lighted by electricity through the long Arctic night. One of their principal diversions is the phonograph.

LEGION GETS SHARE OF SERIES TIE GAME

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 3.—American Legion national headquarters has received a check for \$20,000 from Keweenaw Mountain Landis, commissioner of organized baseball, as the Legion's share in the proceeds of the tie game in the last world's series in New York. Similar checks have been sent to the Veterans of the Foreign Wars and to the Disabled Veterans of the World War, according to a letter from Mr. Landis.

The gift from organized baseball to the ex-service organizations represents one-half of the proceeds of the third world's series game. It was made with the understanding that it would be expended in the betterment of disabled world war veterans. Legion national headquarters has announced that its share of the money will be used solely for sick and wounded veterans and that the machinery for its distribution will be authorized at the next meeting of that organization's national finance committee.
