USE RADIO TO COMBAT CRIME

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 3.—Use of radio as a means of combating the spread of crime and hastening the arrest of criminals will be instituted in Spokane county this spring, according to Sheriff Clarence E. Long.

In explaining his decision to adopt the use of radio, Sheriff Long stated that he believed it would prove of particular value in blocking the activity of criminals who move rapidly from city to city, leaving a long list of crimes in their wake. The plan will be worked out in conjunction with the Northwest association of Sheriffs and Police.

According to the plan mapped out by the Northwest association, every day complete accounts of new crimes committed in any zone, with description of criminals, suspects, finger print classification code. The association has made formal petition to the government radio control board for a distinctive wave length for exclusive use of the association.

As the system is perfected, smaller stations throughout the northwest will be added to the chain of police broadcasting bureaus, with stations in Montana and British Columbia.

BUSSES NEED NOT PAY CITY LICENSE

Supreme Court Holds That Municipalities Cannot Collect Fees From Buses Paying State License.

SALEM, Jan. 3.—A motor bus or stage operating as a common carrier which has been licensed by the public service commission to operate over the public highways of the state is not required to pay additional tribute to a city through which it may pass in the course of its regularly scheduled route.

The supreme court, in an opinion written by Justice McCourt, today reversed the judgment of Judge Campbell of the Clackamas county court, who had convicted E. W. Dent for violation of an ordinance enacted by Oregon City regulating the use of the streets of that city by such carriers. The case is remanded to the lower court with directions that Dent be discharged.

Dent, as the operator of a motor bus, as a common carrier between Portland and Salem had paid the license fees and otherwise complied with all the requirements imposed by the state law, but had not complied with the provisions of an ordinance enacted by Oregon City covering the use of streets within the corporate limits.

Under the provisions of the act of 1921, which repeals all charter powers theretofore granted and ordinances passed pursuant thereto which conflict with those statutes, Justice McCourt points out, "every common carrier of persons or property who has paid the required license tax upon the motor vehicles employed by him and has regularly obtained a certificate from the public service commission permitting him to employ those vehicles as a common carrier, is expressly authorized to operate the same upon the public highways, including streets within the boundaries of cities, for purposes of travel and passage, notwithstanding the prohibitions of any charter provision or ordinance of a municipality."

The ordinance in question prohibits the exercise of the specific rights granted by the statutes to in-carrier carriers. Being in conflict with the statutes, the ordinance is invalid.

"The statutes mentioned recognize an authority in municipalities with charter powers like those possessed by defendant, to enact regulations governing the use of its streets based upon the special conditions of public travel in the municipality and not controlled by the general statutes; in the exercise of this retained power defendant may regulate special or peculiar uses of its streets for purposes other than as thoroughfares."

PICTURE BRIDES ON DECREASE IN HAWAII

HONOLULU, T. H., Jan. 3.—Japanese "picture brides" arriving here in 1921 totaled 555, compared with 1,253 in 1912, according to an announcement made here by R. L. Halsey, inspector in charge of the United States immigration service.

The reason for the decrease, he said, is that many of the modern Japanese young men are seeking their wives among the native born Japanese and that the "girl from home" has not the charm of former years. The literacy test, he said, has not deterred "picture brides."

Nearly everyone from Japan can read and write, and the test is so simple that even a child can pass it," he said.

ONE BULLET KILLS COYOTE AND DOG

JULIAETTA, Idaho, Jan. 2.—How a single bullet from a hunter's rifle killed a coyote and mortally wounded the hunter's dog so that the animal had to be killed is being related here. About four miles below Juliaetta, the Albright brothers have a farm in the Big Lostch canyon. Coyotes abound in the vicinity. Recently one of these marauders was being hard pressed by the Albright brothers and a prized Alredale dog.

The dog caught up to within a few yards of the nearly exhausted animal. The hunter fired. The bullet, of the softnose variety, passed through the body of the coyote, killing the animal immediately. The bullet then struck a rock and glanced. One piece of the shattered missile pierced the Alredale's side and wounded him so severely that it was necessary for the hunters to kill their four-footed companion.

EUGENE, Jan. 3.—Because he was the only rider to travel the Lorane highway, Bill Davis, of Eugene, was declared by Referee Van Kemmery, winner of the 420-mile motorcycle endurance run last night. Six riders took the last lap of the race but five of them decided not to tackle the muddy Lorane highway but to return to Eugene from Cottage Grove on the Pacific highway.

Of the field of 16 starters but six survived the first lap of the race from Eugene to Portland and return. The same six made the run to Roseburg and return.

Yale Smith, local Indian dealer, finished the race with the highest number of points and but for the fact that he did not follow the course as laid down in the rules of the run would have been winner.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

CONCERNING OIL IN DOUGLAS COUNTY

The question of Col. E. W. Cooper "Is there oil to be found in Douglas County?" I wish to state that there are several localities conforming to the description of the above, and there is no question in the mind of the writer, that it will, and that in big measure. The writer comes to this conclusion by the following: About 30 or 32 years ago I was deepening a well at Oak Creek, and a Government official making a geological map of this district, stopped, examined the rocks, took specimens thereof, told the writer he would send him later, what he indicated, and received word later that there might be oil there, or thereabouts. Late an Englishman that had been in the oil fields around the Caspian sea, the oil fields of Baku, and through there, and spent the time and money to locate oil and coal. But misfortune overtook him, he left and we have not heard from him since.

Now the question comes to my mind, what will we do when it is found. This state has bonded itself \$6,000,000, this county \$1,000,000 to build roads, and no other way to pay for them only by taxation. We have claimed this is a free country. Are we? Surely not with all this debt, and more coming.

Now it occurs to me, the wealth 2000 feet under the surface when tapped, should go one third to the owner of the ground, one third to pay for reservoirs, refinery, pipe line, etc., and one third to a sinking fund to county.
