COKE'S APPOINTMENT CONFIRMED BY SENATE

Judge John S. Coke yesterday received his appointment as United States attorney for Oregon following confirmation by the senate.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 3.—Governor Olcott late today announced the appointment of John C. Kendall, attorney of Marshfield, to the office of United States district attorney in Portland to succeed Lester Humphreys.

The appointment of Judge Kendall was announced by Governor Olcott on receipt of a telegram from Senator McNary announcing that the United States senate had confirmed the appointment of Judge Coke.

Judge Kendall will be one of the judges for the second judicial district, which comprises Denton, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Lane and Lincoln counties. Judge Hamilton of Roseburg and Judge Skidmore of Eugene also reside in that district.

The governor yesterday said that Judge Kendall would be his selection for the senate confirmed the Coke appointment. Judge Kendall is a member of the law firm of Kendall & Moss of Marshfield.

PACIFIC COAST HARBORS NEEDED

Facts Regarding Development of West to Be Impressed Upon Congress

THINKS BILL IN DANGER

Senator Stanfield Writes That Congress Contemplates a Big Cut in Harbor Bill This Session

According to a communication received from Senator N. Stanfield, the situation in Congress concerning the appropriations for river and harbor improvements is a serious one so far as the Pacific Coast is concerned. Unless the army recommendation is accepted there will be no improvement work done on the Pacific Coast, and at the present time all indications point to a material reduction in the amount of the proposed appropriation. Mr. Stanfield urges the cooperation of western people in putting this bill through Congress and explains the situation in the following communication:

The program for river and harbor work as outlined by the Army Engineer for the fiscal year beginning July 1, \$13,476,280 is required for maintenance and \$43,113,130 for improvements.

The War department recommended an appropriation by Congress of \$56,589,410 to carry on the work. The Budget Bureau cut this and recommended an appropriation of \$27,500,000.

The appropriations Committee in the House have given some consideration to these recommendations and the indications are they will report and recommend to the House the amount named by the Budget Bureau.

Unless the amount is increased to approximately \$50,000,000 or more we can not expect much work on the Pacific Coast this year, and all new projects authorized at the last session of Congress will not even be started.

The big immediate natural crop, now ready for harvest on the Pacific slope is our timber. Over half of all the saw timber in the United States is in the three States of Washington, Oregon and California.

The big, rapidly increasing market for our timber is in the Atlantic States, where half the population of the United States live, and are now being penalized in high construction costs and exorbitant rents.

Transcontinental freight rates are almost prohibitive, being more than the average value of the lumber on the cars. At western mills and from \$12 to \$18 per thousand feet more than present water rates, which we may confidently expect to be reduced as our chain of water transportation is developed.

This chain is now complete with the one exception of sufficient harbors on the Pacific coast. The Atlantic coast ports have been improved with millions upon millions of Federal money; the Panama Canal has justified its construction and operation and great fleets of vessels are lying idle.

If our western ports were properly developed to receive vessels of sufficiently draft to justify the long trip, we could reduce the cost of building material to the eastern consumer from \$20 to \$30 per thousand feet.

This fact must be impressed on the eastern Congressmen, and when it is, we can expect their support of sufficient appropriations to carry on our work.

The people of the entire Pacific Coast must lay aside all jealousies and community differences, unite, organize and with a grim determination fight for the proper improvement of all available harbors on the Pacific coast.

Congressmen are reasonable human beings, and when the facts are laid before them where they can see the advantages to the whole country and particularly to the populous eastern States, we will have no trouble in getting the necessary appropriations.

One for all and all for one must be our slogan if we are to win in a big way.

KILL TOO MANY WHALES

Valuable Industry Overworked, Says British Expert.

Urges Legislation Against Further Hunting of Whales—Present Rate of Killing Will See Extinction in Another Decade.

London.—If the killing of whales continues at the present rate they will be exterminated before another decade, is the warning given by Sir Sidney F. Hartner, F. R. S., director of Natural history department of the British museum. Recent investigation carried out in the whaling areas has revealed this alarming condition, he says.

The whaling industry has survived since the time of Alfred the Great, despite the fact that there has never been a year known when scores of boats did not leave the ports of England, France, Spain and Scandinavia to hunt the sea animals, Sir Sidney declared in a recent address in which he urged legislation against further hunting of whales.

The Greenland variety of the whale is already thought to be extinct, and the hunting of the last few years has been confined almost entirely to the southern seas.

The profits derived from the killing of these cetaceans are enormous, and they increase yearly as the retail price of the oil and bone increases. A full-sized whale has a ton of whale-bone in its mouth, which alone is worth \$10,000. It also produces about 30 tons of oil, worth about \$100 a ton. In the season of 1915-16 the oil production from Antarctic whaling stations was 654,000 barrels, or about 94,000 tons.

During the war this oil was recognized as of vital importance in the manufacture of nitroglycerin. It is now used in the making of soap.

The principal whales caught today are a species of rorqual, or fin-whales, the blue whale and the sperm whale. The latter, the hunting of which is principally confined to Americans, not only gives sperm oil but often contains ambergris, which is sold at \$20 an ounce and used in the perfumery trade. The oil used for lubricating the wheels of watches comes from the dolphin and is the finest oil known.

HERE'S A HUMAN LANDLORD

Remembering Early Experience He Now Encourages Large Families to Occupy His Tenements.

Lewiston, Me.—If there is a saint's halo for landlords willing to admit large families into their tenements, J. O. Poliquin, fifty-two years old and the father of eleven children, deserves one.

"Young people just starting out in married life should be encouraged in every way," he declares. "I had my experience a quarter of a century ago, being turned out of a home because there were three small children."

"You see, if you want your city to grow you must encourage large families, for the more of these there are the more people, the more patronage for the stores, the more business of all kinds. But you can't encourage this as long as every landlord shuts up his heart and waves away the fathers and mothers with little ones."

"I have one house for newlyweds exclusively; four rooms, curtains and gas stove. They swamped me with applications and only sixteen couples could get under the roof. Later these graduate into larger apartments, where more children can be accommodated."

AIR SERVICE FOR HONDURAS

Government Encourages Ambitious Plans for Mail and Passenger Transportation.

Tegucigalpa, Honduras.—The capital cities of the republics of Central America soon will be linked together by airplane service for passengers and mails. If ambitious plans to this end, encouraged by the government of Honduras, are carried out successfully, an Italian aviator, Luis Stornalova, is now here with six Italian and three French planes. Headquarters are at Tegucigalpa.

BIRTH RATE IN FRANCE DROPS

73,000 Excess Over Deaths Last Year Falls to Only 9,000, Latest Records Show.

Paris.—Vital statistics for the first six months of this year show a decrease of 25,000 births and an increase of 50,000 deaths over the corresponding period in 1921.

The excess of births over deaths, which last year was 73,000, is only 9,000 this year. Births and deaths from January to July of this year numbered 330,000 and 321,000, respectively. In 1921 there were 412,000 births and 343,000 deaths.

Finds Her Lost Diamond in Chicken's Gizzard

Raymond, Wash.—In the gizzard of a chicken that she was preparing for dinner, Mrs. D. R. Rooney of Zebans found a diamond which was lost two months ago from the setting of a ring she wore.

HIGH TRIBUTE TO RABBI WISE

Churchman of Another Faith Expresses Deep Admiration for Character of Jewish Leader.

Every time I hear Rabbi Wise it makes me want to play truant from my own church; he is so vital, so vibrant with intellectual power, so aglow with moral electricity—like a bit of human radium.

Tall, athletic, graceful, his dark brown eyes eagle-like in their brightness; his deep bass voice as velvet in appeal, and resonant in denunciation; his style bristling with epigrams, swift epigrams and phrases that sting the mind with the surprise of beauty—his charm as an orator is equal to his daring as a prophet.

One moment he is walking to and fro like a lawyer at the bar; another, he is exploding some injustice or absurdity with a quick saber-thrust, with now a glint of humor and now a gleam of prophetic indignation.

Emerson said that the man who speaks the truth will find life sufficiently dramatic. It has been so with Rabbi Wise, who early took for his motto: "I will try to see things as they are, and then I will try to say them as I see them." His militant fight for a free pulpit in a free synagogue is memorable in the religious life of America.

As chivalrous as he is fascinating, in New York he is not only a personality but an institution—admired, feared and idolized by turns—a leader of his own people and a captain of the forces making for social justice, civic honor, and national idealism.—Joseph Fort Newton in the Atlantic Monthly.

FROM ANCIENT GREEK COINS

Curator of Boston Museum Believes He Has Found Origin of Old Golden Receipts.

Lacey D. Caskey, curator of classical art at the Boston Art museum, believes that he has made a discovery regarding the origin of the solid gold Greek libation bowl which has just been put on exhibition at the Art museum. "I found the bowl weighed the equivalent of 100 Babylonian shekels, 100 Persian darics and 100 Corinthian statera," explained Mr. Caskey. "The Greeks took their unit of weight from the Orient and when I discovered that the bowl weighed the same in oriental money as in Greek money, I was satisfied that the bowl was made from Greek gold coins of the Seventh century, B. C."

"Another very interesting feature of the bowl," said Mr. Caskey, "is its inscription. 'The sons of Cypselus dedicated this from Heraclia.' The bowl was found at Olympia and it is thought that it was a part of the spoils after the conquest of Heraclia. Cypselus figures as one of the worst tyrants of Greek history, so the inscription bearing his name is considered of historical value. One son of Cypselus Pericles was titled one of the seven wise men of Greece."

BODY SEEN FLOATING IN WILLAMETTE RIVER

EUGENE, Jan. 5.—A body, believed to be that of David Linn, drowned December 7, was seen floating in the Willamette river near the end of River avenue below Eugene about 11:30 this morning. Searching parties have been on the river since then but at 3 o'clock the body had not been found.

The body was first seen by Joe Brock, who lives on River avenue, and was near the foot bridge on the river when he saw the body in the middle of the stream. Brock says he saw the form plainly and that it struck some object in the river just as he caught sight of it. The body turned over and a hand was seen above the surface of the river. The body was clad in brown clothing of the same color as worn by Linn.

Brock rushed to the residence of E. M. Drago on the river road where he phoned for aid in Eugene. Mr. Drago and others went down the river in search of the body. They believe they saw it again floating in mid-stream but not having a boat could not rescue it.

Boats put out from Eugene and other points along the stream. A

watching party is on the river bridge being made at Harrisburg to see that the body does not get past. Every effort is being made to find the body before nightfall.
