WILL INTRODUCE FOUR 'DRY' BILLS

District Attorneys Would Add Strength to Prohibition Laws of State

AUTOES TO BE TAKEN

Bills Would Provide That Cars Transporting Intoxicants Will Become Property of the State

Four bills having the endorsement of the district attorneys of the state, are being prepared and will be presented to the coming legislature with the endorsement of district attorneys, anti-saloon league, the Women's Christian Temperance Union and many other civic and reform organizations.

1. Anti moonshine bill. Making it unlawful to set or possess a still from which moonshine whisky is made...

2. Confiscating automobiles used in transporting liquor. This bill provides for the confiscation of automobiles, boats or any other vehicle which is being used in transporting intoxicating liquor...

3. Prohibiting moonshiners and bootleggers to carry firearms. This bill will prohibit the carrying or having in possession any firearm by those who unlawfully manufacture, transport or sell intoxicating liquor...

4. To provide special fund out of fines to secure evidence and enforce the prohibition law by District attorneys.

BRIDGES WASHED OUT

Train on Marshfield Line Derailed and S. P. Line is Threatened by Weak Embankment

PORTLAND, Jan. 6.—The first word of death in the floods and landslides reported from all parts of the state, came today from Hood River where a crew clearing out rock slides from Columbia gorge found the body of an unidentified man. The Yamhill river rose twelve feet over night at Sheridan, flooding the business district and stopping trains.

BRIDGES ARE TAKEN OUT

PORTLAND, Jan. 6.—The suspension bridge across Hood River, two and a half miles south of the city of Hood River, went out when hit by logs and driftwood last night. Several small bridges near The Dalles are also reported to be out.

Train is Derailed

Five railroads operating into Portland were blocked. Trains were derailed where possible. The train on the Marshfield line was derailed by a slide. The Southern Pacific line south of Salem is in danger of being cut by a weakened embankment.

Lowlands Are Flooded

PORTLAND, Jan. 6.—Flooded valleys in the low country is imminent. Severe flood conditions prevailed throughout the Willamette Valley today and the Portland docks were cleared in many cases for fear of damage should the river continue to rise.
