VICTIMS TREATED IN FIENDISH WAY

Two Men Were Put to Death on Rack of Torture, Say Witnesses

TESTIMONY THRILLING

Bodies Cut to Bits While Men Were Still Alive—Both Men Were Flogged by Masked Kidnapers

RASTROP, La., Jan. 8.—The state officials today promised an exposition of the Ku Klux Klan activities in the court hearing here on the deaths of Watt Daniels and Thomas Richards, murdered brutally by a hooded mob. Wholesale arrests were also promised. Rumors of women's names in connection with the investigation went the rounds today, among them being May Hamilton, aged 19 years, "adopted" by the Klan following an alleged kidnapping last year.

RASTROP, La., Jan. 8.—Watt Daniels and Fletcher Richards, whose dismembered bodies were found floating in Lake LaFourche, were put to death on a rack of torture, according to deductions made by state pathologists who examined their crushed and mutilated bodies. The testimony of the pathologists was put into the record Saturday in the state's investigation into hand outlaws in Morehouse parish.

Exhibiting crushed and broken bones as visible evidence, Dr. Charles Duval and Dr. John Langford testified that scientific examination of the bodies of the two men showed that they had been tortured on a device "specially constructed for inflicting punishment."

That the men who halted the automobile party of which Daniels and Richards were members were black hoods, was testified to by witnesses who felt the wrath of the rulers but were allowed to return to their homes after being flogged.

The father of Watt Daniels, one of the alleged victims of the kidnapping last August, today testified that several days before the kidnapping klansmen had halted him and several companions and taken Daniels' pistol. The father testified that Watt said he recognized among these men, who later returned the pistol, Dr. B. M. McKinn, former mayor of Mer Rouge, and Capt. J. K. Shipworth, exalted cyclops of the Morehouse parish Klan.

Day Marked by Sensations.
These were the outstanding features of a day of sensational testimony, taken under the direction of Governor John M. Parker, to fix responsibility for the slaying of Daniels and Richards and reveal perpetrators of other masked band depredations which the governor has laid at the door of the Ku Klux Klan.

Describing in minute detail the crushed and mutilated condition of the bodies, the two pathologists testified that the men were subjected to torture in what was believed to have been a vice-like contrivance, which broke their bones at equidistant intervals, and that the body of Daniels showed a revolting operation performed before he was put to death.

Dr. Duval declared that the fractures and injuries to the bodies could not have been produced by the explosion of dynamite which preceded the flogging of the bodies on the surface of Lake LaFourche. In the northern part of Morehouse parish, two weeks ago, four months after the two men had been kidnapped by a band of masked men.

"Dynamite explosions could not have produced the results found in the bodies," Dr. Duval declared. "They could not have caused the multiple fractures."

"Another thing, the breaks of the big bones of the two bodies—24 in all, were almost equidistant."

"What would have been the result on the flesh had it been possible to produce the results on the bones by a dynamite explosion?"

"It would have torn the bodies to pieces," Dr. Duval said.

Torso of Bodies Intact.
The torsos of the bodies were virtually intact, Dr. Duval said, as were the internal organs.

In addition to the crushing of the bones, Dr. Duval testified that a critical operation had been performed on Daniels, with evidence to show that the part of the body had been removed by a sharp instrument, evidently a knife or a razor.

Dr. Duval said the examination of the bodies showed that the injuries were ante-mortem, Dr. Duval said.

Dr. Duval completed his testimony at noon. Announcement was made that Dr. Langford would take the stand in the afternoon.

Two witnesses, J. L. Daniels, father of Watt, and W. C. Andrews, described members of the mob which halted the party en route, from Rastrop to their homes in Mer Rouge on the evening of August 24 last as blackhounds.

Both Flogged by Raiders.
Daniels, a man nearly 30 years old, and Andrews, 25, declared they were flogged by the raiders. Andrews testified he was beaten until he was numb. The elder man declared he was not given more than four or five blows.

Free the first time during the inquiry, which began Friday, reference was made Saturday to the "klan." "I believe it was some members of the klan, maybe not the action of the

klan as an organization, but some members of the klan," Andrews said. He declared, however, he could not name any man whom he suspected of being implicated.

Testimony of the two men was along similar lines. They declared they were returning from Rastrop, where they attended a barbecue and baseball game and were halted by an automobile parked across the road.

"We were stopped at a crossroad," Andrews testified, "by a crowd of men, 15 or 20, who wore black hoods. Seized and blindfolded."

"One came to the car in which I was riding, covered me with a gun and ordered me to the road. I was blindfolded with a red bandana handkerchief, my hands were tied and I was taken to the side of the road. Soon after the elder Daniels was taken prisoner and seated beside me. I heard a voice which I recognized as that of Watt Daniels saying, 'Wait a minute. Don't be so fast.'"

Then I was questioned as to an attempt which had been made to assassinate Dr. McKinn. I told them I knew nothing of it; that I was in another part of the parish at the time. "They said they knew I had something to do with it and were going to whip me to make me tell."

"Next old man Daniel and I were taken to some woods, where I was whipped until I was numb. They told me if I could not talk they were going to hand me. Then they whipped old man Daniel."

Andrews said after the flogging the two men, with Tot Davenport, another of the Mer Rouge party who was taken prisoner, were put in an automobile and taken to Collinston, where they were released and told they might catch a train back to Mer Rouge. Davenport was not mistreated, Andrews said. "I was told to go back home and be a good boy," Andrews said. "I was asked if I had recognized any of the men, and when I said I did not, I was told I ought to be glad I didn't."

Rendered Ill From Flogging.
Andrews said that the flogging he received made it necessary that he undergo medical treatment and that while he was lying on the ground he was either struck or kicked.

He said that he was unable to recognize any members of the mob, either the older Daniels, like Andrews, declared that he was unable to recognize any members of the mob, either by their voices or build.

The aged man declared that while he was being held, blindfolded, on the side of the road, he heard his granddaughter, a 15-year-old girl, exclaim: "Oh, Watt! Oh, Watt! Oh, Watt!" During the course of his testimony Daniels declared that some time prior to the holding his son had reported to him that he and several companions had been halted by klansmen in another part of the parish and his pistol taken from him. He testified Watt told him he recognized one of the men as Dr. McKinn, another as Capt. J. K. Shipworth of Rastrop and another as a man named Calhoun.

Daniels said his son and his companions were not harmed and that the pistol was returned to him later.

PORTLAND BANK ROBBED OF \$8,000

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 6.—More than \$8000 in currency was stolen by a sneak thief, who unlocked a teller's window and scooped up all available currency, at the Ashley & Rainier bank, Second and Stark streets, during the noon-hour rush yesterday.

The thief escaped without leaving a clue to his identity. Though police and private detectives began work at once on the case, they had made no progress toward recovery of the stolen money or the arrest of the robber last night.

The crime, one of the most extraordinary in the annals of Portland banking houses, was committed so cleverly that it was several hours before the loss was discovered. Employees of the banking house have been exonerated of all suspicion in connection with the robbery.
