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LAW AVENGED ANCIENT MURDER

(The United Press.)
RALEIGH, N. C., Jan. 9.—Thirty one years ago Yon Winkler, a prosperous young mountaineer, married Candace Miller, a pretty girl, and took her to live in a rough log cabin.

For two years to all appearances they lived happily together and then one night the young bride was found unconscious and dying from injuries received, Winkler said, when she fell from the loft of the cabin.

But retribution stalked out of the shadows of a crime that had all but disappeared from the memory of

neighbors and Winkler was sentenced from 25 to 30 years' imprisonment for the murder committed twenty-nine years ago.

Last June Winkler had John Shepherd, a neighbor, arrested for molesting the youngest daughter of his second marriage, a child of nine years old.

When Shepherd was brought into court he declared that he was overwhelmed by a wave of repentance and made an affidavit that Winkler had admitted to him in 1891 that he had slain his girl bride and that he had threatened to kill him if he told.

Shepherd swears that it was not revenge that caused him to reveal the crime, but a desire to have relief from the burden of the hidden crime.

On Shepherd's affidavit and the testimony of old residents of the mountain country, Winkler was convicted and sentenced from 25 to 30 years' imprisonment. He appealed the case, but the state supreme court sustained the verdict.

Now, Winkler a broken old man, will soon begin the sentence which for a man at his age is practically a life term, after keeping his secret twenty-nine years.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

Roseburg Ore.

Editor News-Review:
At no time in the history of the world has the prohibition of intoxicating liquors been as necessary as at the present time.

In my boyhood days I have often seen people going home over the public highways so completely intoxicated that they had to depend wholly or in part on the good "horse sense" of the animals that they were supposed to be driving in order to get home at all. That day has passed. In fact we might as well say that the day of horses has passed as far as driving purposes is concerned. Today their place has been taken by the high power speed motor cars and trucks that rush along at express train speed and require only a small wrong twist of the hand of man, not only the death of the driver and his passengers, but also the death of the occupants of the car that is going in the opposite direction.

A few years ago the great car ships were unloaded by laboring men with wheelbarrows but today a trained operator handles electric loading machinery worth thousands of dollars. The same is true in the other industries. The laboring man of yesterday who could do his simple tasks fairly well with an alcohol befuddled brain is being replaced by highly trained mechanics whose brains must be 100 per cent efficient all of the time.

A great cry is being raised at the present time to have light wine and beer classified as nonintoxicating and allowed by statute. They claim that the Volstead law cannot be enforced and by allowing these lighter drinks it would be easier to enforce the law. An Eastern paper exposes the fallacy of this argument by saying that according to that reasoning Chicago should alter her traffic laws so as not to include Fords for their speed is not very great anyway and by eliminating them it would make it easier to make the owners of the other makes to obey the law.

Some people do not seem to realize that the prohibition fight is not over. At a recent international meeting of the liquor interests of the world held in Brussels. Millions of money was pledged to help defeat prohibition in the United States. To show how completely some European countries are under the control of the liquor interests I will give you a few incidents. Take the example of Iceland which adopted prohibition in 1908, she has been compelled to suspend this law because Spain and France refused to allow her to sell her fish in those countries unless she did. Sweden was only prevented from adopting prohibition by the threat of France, Spain, Italy and Portugal that they would boycott her if she did.

Georges L'Gallienne of Paris is authority for the statement that ten out of every thirteen people in France are connected with the drink business in some form and that France at present is spending \$2,500,000,000.00 annually for liquor. In other words with one-third of the population of the U. S., their drink bill is equal to that of the U. S. before prohibition went into effect. Yet France is telling us that she is unable to pay back what she owes us. Any who favor such a policy please take notice.

Allow me to mention just one incident to show you that the liquor interests of Europe have reason to be alarmed. Winston Churchill who has represented Edinburgh for the last fourteen years in the British Parliament was recently defeated by a man who is an out and out prohibitionist.

The liquor interests of the world have decided to make a supreme effort during the next twenty-two months so that they can elect a wet congress and if possible a wet president in 1924. During the great war I read that more men were killed in repulsing the counter attack than were killed when a trench was first taken from the enemy. We have taken the trench and we are now experiencing the counterattack. Would we be good Americans if we quietly allowed the enemy to come back and occupy 80 per cent of the trench that was so hard to take? That is what it would amount to for wine and beer comprised over 80 per cent of the liquor traffic of the old license days.

There are three principle methods used by the liquor interests to accomplish their purpose. The first is misrepresentation; the second is bribery; and the third is a combination of the first two. A favorite trick is to circulate the report that liquor can be bought without the least trouble and that more liquor is being drunk than before prohibition law went into effect. These stories are passed from mouth to mouth often by innocent friends of prohibition. Be careful not to circulate such stories unless you know them to be true and in that case tell it to the sheriff. The big idea is to make it appear that the prohibition laws cannot be enforced and that conditions are worse than they were under license.

Last winter I had opportunity to observe for myself conditions in some of the big cities. I was especially eager to observe conditions in the cities where I had been well acquainted during license days. I spent some time in both St. Louis and Chicago and talked with such people as bartenders, bootleggers, etc., as well as to observe very closely both by day and night. I saw very little intoxication, only a small fraction of what was visible in the days of license. I do not doubt that there are many and flagrant violations of the prohibition laws but the percentage is small even in those wet cities.

Another favorite misrepresentation is that prohibition increases the use of narcotics. Here is one of the latest answers. In a recent speech Premier Druy of the Province of Ontario gave out these figures. "In one year," the Premier said, "the convictions for the use of drugs in the seven prohibition provinces was

711, or 12 to the 100,000. In the two wet provinces, Quebec and British Columbia, the convictions for the use of drugs in one year were 1153, or 40 per 100,000 of the population."

I have long thought that our laws were too lenient with the bootlegger and moonshiner. Clearly it is unjust to give a young man two years in the penitentiary for stealing a gun and giving a moonshiner a comparatively small fine with perhaps a few days in the county jail for making poison that in a large number of cases actually kills and often drives the drinker blind or perhaps makes him commit murder.

There is to be a bill introduced into our legislature this winter which if it becomes a law will make it a felony for any bootlegger or moonshiner to arm himself with any fire arm or deadly weapon, punishable by imprisonment in the state penitentiary for not less than one year. It also provides a fine of not less than \$300 and a jail sentence of not less than three months for moonshining and the second offense to be made a felony with a fine up to \$3,000 and a minimum of one year in the pen.

Let us give this bill our hearty support and demand its passage this winter.

FOREST SERVICE BUILDING ROADS

During the past year the Forest Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, made allotments of \$443,308 for the construction of 644.19 miles of roads in the North Pacific District, (Oregon and Washington,) according to a statement just issued by the District Forester's office. During the same period \$43,648 was allotted for road maintenance, \$158,732 for trail construction, and \$158,732 for trail construction, and district.

Figures just received from Washington, D. C., show that during the year 1921 the Forest Service constructed 724 miles of minor roads at a cost of \$540,868 and 2959 miles of trails at a cost of \$519,429. Three hundred and eighty miles of major roads were constructed for the Forest Service by the Bureau of Public Roads at a cost of \$4,620,322. In addition 3,097 miles of major and minor projects were maintained at a cost of \$187,162, of which \$65,336 was secured from local authorities. Forty-two hundred and ninety-four miles of trails were maintained at a cost of \$113,632. This represents a total expenditure for the construction of roads and trails during the year of 1921 of \$6,456,694, which includes \$2,153,522 cooperative funds secured from states and counties.

Expenditures to January 1, 1922, for constructing 5,729 miles of major roads total \$15,301,373, of which \$5,681,451 are cooperative funds. Likewise 4,854 miles of minor roads were constructed by the Service at a cost of \$2,752,970, including \$773,922 of cooperative funds. To date \$1,817,163 have been expended in the construction and maintenance of 12,448 miles of trails. The total thus far expended upon equipment amounts to \$651,608, while \$920,134 was expended upon overhead and administration by the Bureau of Public Roads and Forest Service.

To date the total expenditure of \$22,215,724 for the construction of 4,786 miles of roads, 6,711 miles of trails, and the maintenance of 3,097 miles of roads and 5,727 miles of trails has been made.

Right Angle Timber Brace, Important Part of Vessel, Named for Human Leg Joint.

HUMANS OWE MUCH BESIDE GLANDS TO BRUTE CREATION

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Jan. 9.—(U. P.)—Dr. Voronoff, famous surgeon who made the transplanting of monkey glands international conversation did not tell one hundredth of it, according to physicians in the medical department of the University of Pennsylvania.

Experiments in rejuvenating youth by the use of glands has been under way by the medical world since the stone age. More than 50 years ago a French doctor compounded an extract of glands that was supposed to be the elixir of youth.

oped, to stimulate mental activity. The brains are not transplanted, they are dried and an extract or powder made from them. Young calves' brains are also used to prevent hemorrhages.

Billie is taken from the gall bladder of hogs and cattle and used for intestinal indigestion and to promote the absorption of fat.

For neurasthenia, mental disorder, premature senility, tuberculosis and similar diseases, the brain and the substance of the spinal cord of cattle are used.

The red blood cells of cattle are extracted and used in "wasting" diseases, while the kidneys of all slaughter house animals are dried to use in uricemic conditions.

Various forms of the "adrenal extract" of cattle are used for male impotence, low blood pressure, malarial anemia and other ailments. The outer layer of the upper part of the small intestine of pig is used for functional indigestion and certain forms of diabetes.

Extracts for the treatment of gonorrhea and rheumatism is obtained from the liver of cattle and hogs and labeled "parenchyma" by physicians. The lymph nodes of young cattle are used for adenoids, hypertrophy of the tonsils and for undernourishment.

"There are several thousand parts of the body of animals that are used in the treatment of human beings," the physician said. "Of course the idea material would be of human origin but it is impracticable as the source of supply is too precarious."

"We use wild animals the same as we do domestic stock. Monkeys and supply extracts for medical use as do kangaroos and beasts of the jungles."
