NEW BUILDING AT HOME IS WANTED

of an irrigation and fire fighting system. When the state institution was first located in West Roseburg a four inch main was built to it. Since then the West Side has become one of the principal residence sections of the city, but no larger water mains have been installed and the water supply is entirely inadequate for domestic supply and fire protection purposes.

The lack of water for fire fighting purposes was clearly shown in two recent residence fires in that part of the city.

The state has equipped the institution with hand extinguishers in all the buildings and has also provided a hand chemical engine, which will be of great value in the case of a small fire which can be reached immediately, but a big fire in some of the large wooden buildings would probably wipe out the entire institution as there is practically no water under sufficient pressure available.

Largely because of this lack of water the beautiful grounds have been allowed to become unsightly while the large garden space is only partly utilized. With the installation of a pump, electrically operated, and a six inch main from the river, plenty of water would be assured for irrigation purposes and in the event of fire suitable pressure could be maintained to fight the blaze.

It is also proposed that this main be connected with the four inch main supplying city water. It would be used only in the event of emergencies, but should there be a fire on the West side, the pressure would be used to meet that event and would assist in providing protection for that part of the city.

Aside from these two additions the budget covers only the usual needs for maintenance, repair and operating costs. In fact, a slight cut has been made in some of these funds, necessitating the strictest economy in the conduct of the affairs of the institution.

DAM AT UMPQUA FISH HATCHERY DAMAGED

According to John Alexander of Glide, who was in Roseburg today, the north end of the Umpqua Fish hatchery dam above Glide was washed out during the recent high waters. Mr. Alexander says that the water cut around the north end of the dam, taking out the wing wall and cutting into the soft dirt banks almost back to the county road. The work of destruction was made more serious by large quantities of driftwood carried downstream by the swollen current. Mr. Alexander says. A number of row-boats belonging to residents of that part of the county were swept away and have not yet been recovered.
