SALEM, Jan. 11.—Jury duty for women is made mandatory in a bill introduced in the house today by Schulmerich. The bill changes the existing statute only insofar as it strikes out the clause allowing women to claim exemption from such duty.

morning by Representative Blowers of Hood River. The bill would go back to the old system of starting the counting of ballots after the polls are closed.

Justice of the peace, are prohibited splitting any fines whatsoever with any peace officer under the terms of a bill introduced by Representative Graham. The fines referred to are those collected for violation of the motor vehicle laws and the new bill would make them applicable to the road funds.

Funding or refunding bonds of a school district shall not be considered an increase of the five per cent limitation on the issuance of such bonds if a bill introduced by Representative Graham becomes a law.

One of the moves of the Federated Societies of Oregon came this morning in the house when Lewis introduced a bill to do away with Columbus day as a public holiday and substitute therefor Armistice day. Armistice day already is a school holiday under existing statutes.

An eight hour day in sawmills, planing mills, shingle mills and logging camps is provided for by a bill introduced in the house today by Woodward. Only three hours overtime is allowed in any one day by the bill and that at a rate of a time and one-half over the regular wage.

The senate convened at 10:10 o'clock yesterday morning, cleared its decks in ten minutes and recessed.

Under the provisions of this bill the first half of all taxes would be due and payable on June 1, instead of April 1 and the last half would be due on or before November 1 instead of October 5. Taxes not paid by November 1 would become delinquent and the penalty would attach December 1.

Senate bills introduced were:
S. B. 1—Strayer—A bill designating the east and west highway through Oregon as the Old Oregon Trail.
S. B. 2—Johnson—Changing dates for payment of taxes to June 1 and November 1 and date of penalty to December 1.
