"THE LOVES OF PHAROAH" CAUSES RUN ON LIBRARIES

Ernest Lubitsch, the famous European motion picture producer has a way of making you want to read the encyclopedia and books on history. Wherever his massive picture, "Pharaoh," was shown, librarians report a big demand for books on the French revolution.
