LEGISLATORS HOME FOR THE WEEK-END

Delegation Has Secured Strong Positions in Both Houses—Senator Eddy Has Introduced Several Bills

The members of the Douglas county delegation returned home today to spend the week-end. All have received excellent committee appointments and are working hard at their duties. Representative Thorne is a member of the ways and means committee, where he is in close touch with the work of the lower house, while Representative Beale is also on responsible committee, Senator Eddy has already introduced several bills into the upper house. One provides that county courts may build bridges not exceeding \$50,000 in cost, without the necessity of securing plans, etc., from the state bridge commission. At the present time the commission controls all repair and construction work on bridges where the work amounts to more than \$2,500 and the courts claim that the department requires bridges of too expensive design. Douglas county has already had considerable trouble in this regard. Another bill introduced by Senator Eddy would put the court reporter on a flat salary and would provide fees to be collected from the litigants to pay this salary. At the present time the county is required to pay out large fees to the reporter where transcripts are required in cases where the defendant is unable to bear the costs. The creation of a salaried office with provisions for meeting the salary would result in a saving to the county.

Another measure of much importance, not introduced by the senator, but having his approval and support, is one placing the expenditure of the market road funds in the hands of the county court instead of the state.

The amount of ground necessary to provide a sufficient supply of fruit for family use is small. A row fifty feet long will set forty to fifty strawberry plants and from fifteen to twenty-five raspberry or blackberry plants.

Gooseberry and currant bushes grow best in a cool, moist location and can be planted in a fruit tree row to good advantage.—O. A. D. Baldwin in Farm Life.

that it is his desire to see the street planted into roses. They adapt themselves easily to any form of hedge or bush, and a very attractive plan can be easily worked out. Coming into the city by way of Winchester Street a person obtains an excellent view of the city. If trees were planted it would be only a few years until this view would be lost.

"The great majority of people believe that Roseburg is named for the beautiful flowers which grow here," Mayor Rice said, "and even some of those who have spent a number of years here do not know that the city obtained its name from its founder, Uncle Aaron Rose. The tourist who comes into the city and sees the beautiful flowers growing here immediately thinks that the name of the city comes from the flower. There is no reason why Roseburg should not make use of this belief by an abundance of roses. They make beautiful park decorations and they fit in so well with the name of the city that they should be used more abundantly in beautifying our premises."

Various kinds of roses were discussed and the methods of planting them considered. A rose hedge with the vines trained on low hung wires requires but little attention and forms a continuous row of bloom and color. The city is considering planting Dorothy Perkins roses on the steep bluff on its property near the head of the street. These roses are very adaptable for such a purpose as they will climb up the face of a steep incline and will take firm root wherever the tips touch the ground forming a heavy tangle of roses and requiring practically no care.
