CONCESSION FOR CAVES IS ASKED

W. C. Burch of Gresham, who at one time held a squatter's right on the land surrounding the famous Oregon Caves in Josephine county, is, according to a letter received here by his son, Mr. Earl Burch, of the C. A. Lockwood Motor company, endeavoring to obtain a concession giving him control of the caves for a period of years. Mr. Earl Burch stated this morning that his father squatted on the land hoping to be permitted to apply for it under the homestead or timber act, and lived there for more than three years, only relinquishing his right when the government withdrew the land from entry and made it a part of the national forest and later a national park.

During his residence there he explored the caves a number of times, and measured the great underground passageways for more than three miles. It is proposed by Mr. Burch, senior, to organize a company if the concession can be obtained and regularly incorporate for financing the enterprise. According to the information given out this morning by Earl Burch, the tentative plans are to build a commodious hotel, erect a number of log cottages for renting to tourists, maintain a camping ground for tourists, and supply guides for parties exploring the caves or the adjacent mountains. It is proposed to charge a fee for this service, and it is believed by Mr. Burch that since the caves are regularly visited by thousands of tourists, that the enterprise will pay well. It is understood that Mr. Burch has already made application for the desired concession from the federal government.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

With Cures and Faith Healers.

for News-Review:—

At this time there are many people in southern Oregon, who are very interested in faith healing. It has been alleged that cases of myopia, cancer, and many other diseases have been cured by faith healing; and the questions are often asked: how do they effect their cures, who, or what is it that heals, are the healings brought about by divine, or spiritual power?

A slight understanding of our inner selves and our mental processes will clear up many things in regard to faith healing, which we have often puzzled over before.

Below the level of the conscious and there is another mind, many times stronger, which we call the sub-conscious mind. The sub-conscious mind, which does not think,

or reason, governs and controls the mechanism of the human frame; and whenever it accepts the thoughts of health or sickness conveyed by the conscious mind, it often manifests the same on the body.

The sub-conscious realization of the belief that God heals the sick operates in accordance with one essential law, the law of reversed effort, and this causes the cripple to throw away his crutches and walk, or the tumor to disappear. I have been informed that the afflicted, who are healed in this way, do not often stay healed.

The faith healer conducting revival services, by preaching with great religious fervor arouses the emotions of his audience to the highest pitch; then he anoints the heads of his patients with oil, places his hands on them, and conveys to their sub-conscious minds the thought that God will heal them; and their maladies are often destroyed. This kind of healing is not of divine origin. It is not God, but the sub-conscious mind manifesting the thought conveyed to it, which heals the sick.

Faith healing is a blind belief. It is mental, and it never touches the realm of spiritual consciousness. There is one difficulty which no system of mental healing has been entirely able to overcome, and that is to keep from exercising the will, which prevents the sub-conscious
