MERGER CASE TO BE SETTLED SOON

Tentative Decision Has Been Handed Down by Interstate Commerce Commission

CALIFORNIA IS HELPED

Freight Originating in Middle West for Shipment to Orient Would Be Routed by Way of San Francisco

SALEM, Jan. 12.—A tentative decision has been rendered by the interstate commerce commission in the Southern Pacific-Central Pacific merger case which seems partially a Southern Pacific victory over Union Pacific contentions as well as a victory for California over Oregon. All interested parties have been asked for an expression of opinion when hearings begin on January 17, after which the final decision will be rendered.

The tentative finding leaves no provision for the construction of the Naton cut-off, nor does it refer to a common user clause in the event that the cut-off to southeastern Oregon be completed. The plan involves lease of the Central Pacific by the Southern Pacific until December 31, 1934, subject to termination by order of the commission if it conflicts with the commission's final plan of railroad consolidation. It further involves ownership by the Southern Pacific of the issues and outstanding capital stock of the Central Pacific during the continuance of the lease, subject to stipulated conditions.

Common user privileges, joint maintenance by both Union and Southern Pacific is provided for the Central Pacific lines between Omaha and San Francisco as part of continuous service between Chicago and the bay cities, equal in every respect to that afforded by either line to Los Angeles or Portland.

The Southern Pacific must cooperate with the Union Pacific to secure by solicitation the routing of the maximum of freight traffic via Union Pacific and Central Pacific lines through the Missouri river points and Ogden as parts of one continuous line between all points in California, north and including California and Santa Margarita, including points in Oregon on the Elkhart Falls branch, Kirk and south, at this one hand, and points north and west of a line along the northern boundaries of Oklahoma and Arkansas to the Mississippi and Ohio rivers (but not including intermediate cities on the Ohio river) to Wheeling, W. Va., thence north on a line drawn just east of Pittsburgh and Buffalo to Niagara Falls.

Under this decision, freight originating in the central portion of the United States for shipment to the Orient will be routed through San Francisco, instead of through Portland or Seattle, as at present, and hence the position of San Francisco as an export shipping port is greatly strengthened, and the northwest proportionately weakened.

The decision benefits the Southern Pacific by extending its lease over the Central Pacific, but injures it and benefits the Union Pacific by diverting to it over the Ogden gateway traffic now sent through the El Paso route of the Southern Pacific system. It benefits the Union Pacific by providing common user privileges from Ogden west.

Central Pacific lines, now operated by the Southern Pacific, and of the proposed Naton cut-off, by any road seeking entrance into the valley from eastern Oregon. In other words, the Oregon commission wants joint use for the Central Pacific lines in the Willamette valley in order to secure completion of Oregon railroad systems. It already has appeals pending before the interstate commerce commission to order the construction of a line across central Oregon from Crater to Oakridge and the closing of the gap between Bend and Kirk.
