## SIDELIGHTS ON THE LEGISLATURE

SALEM, Jan. 12.—The rift in the otherwise friendly relations between the senate and house ways and means committees, which appeared upon the surface for the first time at the initial meeting of the joint committee Tuesday night, became an unbridgable chasm today.

Hereafter, throughout the present session at least, the two committees are going to play in their own back yards and each will function entirely independent of the other, meeting in joint session only for the purpose of hearing the claims of the various applicants for a helping from the state funds.

The split between the two committees started over the attempt, as alleged by the senate committee, to run the whole show. Representative Fletcher, chairman of the house ways and means committee, it seems, had presumed to engage a chief clerk for the joint committee without even consulting the senate members who objected to this assumption of senatorial prerogatives, especially since it involved the employment of Schroeder who was charged with having held the state up for \$20 a day for his services during the last legislative session.

## ONE-THIRD OF TAGS SENT OUT

SALEM, Jan. 11.—A total of 56,000 applications had been made for 1923 automobile license plates to Wednesday, according to estimates by Secretary of State Kozer. At an average of \$25 for each set of plates, the receipts of the automobile registration department for this year so far are estimated at approximately \$1,400,000.

Based upon the average increase in registrations for the past several years, it is expected that 150,000 motor vehicles will be wearing the blue and white Oregon plates by the end of this year, which means that only a few more than one-third of the automobiles and trucks in the state are as yet authorized to operate over the public highways.

## UNIVERSITY HAS BUILDING CAMPAIGN

BERKELEY, Calif., Jan. 13.—One of the most pretentious building programs in the history of the University of California is nearing completion, the alterations, removals, remodeling, and new building started during the year 1922 called for the expenditure of one and one-quarter million dollars.

In addition to the construction and improvement of a large number of academic buildings during the year the site was cleared for the new memorial stadium, a mammoth structure which will be located in Strawberry Canyon, back of the university property.

The new physics buildings, Le Conte Hall, will cost when completed \$500,000. The building will be ready for occupancy next fall at the beginning of the fall semester. The moving and remodeling of the old zoology building, the site of which was taken for Le Conte Hall, cost \$35,000.

The Stephens memorial building, which houses all the activities of the student body, cost \$300,000 all of which was raised by subscription. Rehabilitation of the botany building and repairs to the infirmary added \$75,000 more to the total. Haviland Hall, to be used by the department of Education, is under construction and will be ready for use by this time next year. It will cost \$250,000. The first unit of a new mechanics' building which has been started will cost \$35,000.

These buildings will probably be the only ones built for some time with the exception of a new Hearst Hall for a women's physical education. William Randolph Hearst has promised a new building to replace old Hearst Hall destroyed by fire last June.

## OREGON REGISTERS MANY AUTOMOBILES

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 12.—Oregon registered 134,566 motor vehicles during 1922, according to the annual report just issued by Secretary of State Sam Kozer. Fees collected by the motor vehicles license department totaled \$3,340,420. There were 16,000 more motor vehicles in the state on December 30, 1922, than there were on the same date in 1921.

For 1923 Secretary Kozer estimates licenses issued will exceed 150,000, although to date less than half of this number of car owners have taken out the new blue and white number plates. As usual, the period of grace has been extended and thousands of cars will sport their old tags until they can get through applications for their new pairs. Hundreds of other car owners store their cars through the winter and take out their licenses at the beginning of the second quarter, thus saving money on the license and on upkeep for the car where heavy weather prevents its continual use.

## TUBERCULOSIS IS TAKING BIG TOLL

PHOENIX, Arizona, Jan. 12.—There were 655 deaths from tuberculosis in Arizona during the six month period ending June 30, 1922, according to figures just compiled by the State Board of Health. Deaths of women, the figures showing the deaths of 467 men and only 198 women. Of the total 475 were whites, 135 Mexicans, 24 Indians, and the remainder were scattered among other races.

The total number of death from all causes for the same period was 2604.

## ENGLISH STAR IS IN NEW PICTURE

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
