REEDSPORT, Jan. 12.—A meeting of the commissioners of the port of Umpqua held on Saturday January 6th at 11 o'clock a. m. after adjournment from the evening before because of the lack of a quorum, was the occasion for the installation of the new commissioners elected to the port commission.

W. H. Jewett of Gardiner and R. J. Hubbard of Reedport took the oath of office.

The organization of the new port body was completed without much discussion, motion of W. H. Jewett naming the officers to be chosen being passed unanimously and the secretary was instructed to cast the vote of the entire commission for the following: President, J. R. Butler; vice president, W. F. Peck; secretary, J. R. Butler; treasurer, R. J. Hubbard; commissioner, W. H. Jewett.

It was also decided to retain the services of the present assistant Secretary Stanley D. Chaplin.

PREDATORY ANIMALS SEE UNHEALTHY YEAR

PORTLAND, Oregon, Jan. 11.—The year 1922 was an unhealthy one for predatory animals in Oregon. It has been estimated by the Federal Biological Survey that 45,000 predatory animals were destroyed by hunters, poison bait and traps, during the year.

Livestock valued at \$10,000,000 owned by farmers in this state are the beneficiaries of the efforts of the U. S. government hunters who are using every expert method to exterminate coyotes, bobcats, gray wolves, mountain lions, and bears.

The past year marked a considerable increase in the slaughter of coyotes. The biological survey accounted for the death of over 27,000 coyotes, 6,822 bobcats, 671 large gray wolves, more than 150 mountain lions or cougars, and 114 bears. Thousands of coyotes died of poison in inaccessible places where their bodies could not be obtained as evidence, according to the survey estimate.

MOVIES

(By United Press) LOS ANGELES, Jan. 15.—Cecil B. DeMille, producer of Paramount pictures, is planning a trip to wild barren Tiburon Island, in the Gulf of California.

While the trip will be in the nature of a vacation, DeMille, and a number of friends who will make up the passenger list of his palatial 100 foot power schooner "Seaward," will make a study of the primitive conditions on the island.

The producer became interested in the study of primitive life while working on "Adam's Rib," and has selected Tiburon Island for further investigation because of its isolation and because its few native inhabitants are reported to be close to the cannibal stage of existence.

Scientists have declared that the Tiburon savages, who eat raw flesh and live by most primitive methods, are practically 4000 years behind modern civilization. Their island is rarely visited even by the fishing boats from the coast of Mexico.

In DeMille's picture, just completed, the cave-man existence of 25,000 years ago was supposed to be portrayed and DeMille preparing for the picture, made an exhaustive scientific "book study" of the supposed conditions. Now that the picture is completed he wants to make a study of real life, at least as far as it is possible.

He will be accompanied by Paul Trier, designer, John Fisher, sportsman-scientist, and Carmen Runyon, apicalist.
