## S. GOLD NOTES ARE OFFERED FOR SALE

The Secretary of the Treasury is announcing a new offering of United States Savings Bonds and accepted interest of about \$1,000,000 in 1917 Notes of the United States (Series A-1917) dated January 15, 1927, and payable December 15, 1927. The interest will be 1-2 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on June 15 and December 15 in each year. They will be offered in denominations of \$100, \$50, \$10, \$5, \$2, \$1, and 50 cents, and will be subject to redemption before maturity. The bonds will be sold at a discount of 10 per cent from their face value, and will be subject to redemption before maturity. Notes of this series to the extent that unregistered 1918 War Savings Certificate Stamps and 4 3-4 per cent Victory Notes are tendered in payment. The Treasury Department is thus offering practically a five-year Note in the expectation that this maturity will be sufficiently attractive to individual investors, at the 4 1-2 per cent rate, to secure a considerable redemption of the proceeds of the Victory Notes which were "called" for redemption on December 15 last and of the 1918 issue of War Savings Certificate Stamps which matured January 1, 1923, and that at the same time it may attract through exchange a substantial volume of the unregistered Victory Notes which still remain outstanding and mature on May 20 next in the amount of about \$850,000,000.

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Reports received by the Treasury Department indicate that about \$200,000,000 of the \$250,000,000 maturity value of 1918 War Savings Certificate Stamps, which became due January 1, 1923, have been redeemed or exchanged up to date. Cash redemptions and exchanges for the new Treasury Savings Certificates are progressing steadily and heavy returns are coming in from all sections of the country. Apparently great numbers of the Stamps, however, are still in the hands of millions of holders throughout the country and have not yet been put in process of redemption or exchange, notwithstanding the fact that these Stamps matured on the first of this month and yield no interest after that date.

The Treasury Department urges people generally to look up their holdings of the 1918 War Savings Certificate Stamps and make early presentation of them either for cash redemption or for exchange into the new Treasury Savings Certificates which are on sale everywhere in convenient denominations and on attractive terms.

## SUSTAINS HEAVY ACCIDENT LOSS

(By United Press.)  
LOS ANGELES, Jan. 15.—Los Angeles sustained the amazing loss of \$19,681,800 from accidents during 1927 according to figures made public by the Automobile Club of Southern California. The accidents recorded were of all sorts, including automobile, train, and industrial mishaps.

Actual property damage to automobiles during the year, according to the Automobile Club estimates, was \$871,245, which was sustained in 34,585 automobile accidents.

The average cost of each automobile accident is \$221.30, which does not include the many minor accidents which are not reported by owners.

In estimating the total loss resulting from accidents, the Safety Bureau of the Auto Club has based its figures on the mortality tables and economic value of human life as given by the United States Census Bureau, which estimates that the average economic value of a human life to the community is \$11,578.75. The maximum age limit of 72 is used, beyond which the average individual cannot be considered as a producer or a full economic unit in the community.

Figures show that there are 125 non-fatal accidents for every fatal one and that the cost of non-fatal accidents is three times that of fatal ones.

There were 412 fatal accidents during the past year. Using this figure as a basis for estimating the economic loss due to accidents, the club finds that fatalities themselves during the year represent a cost of \$4,770,450.

Three times this, or the cost of non-fatal accidents, amounts to \$14,312,350.

Large as the figures are, the club points out that they are an improvement over previous years. The total accidents per year in 1921 amounted to 54.6 per 100,000 population, while in 1922 they decreased to 48.4 per 100,000 population.

## TAX ORGANIZATIONS FIGHTING HIGH LEVIES

(By United Press.)

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 15.—Half a dozen or more tax organizations, unanimous in the opinion that the cost of government is too high but unable to agree either on plans for reducing the cost or redistributing the tax burden, promise to stage the principal contests before the present session of the Washington State legislature which began its 40-day session here last Monday. Members of the new legislature are pledged to a program of economy that may result in the repeal of some of the existing tax levies. But the effort to lighten the tax burden, on property by shifting a part of it to new sources of revenue is so hopelessly involved in bitter controversies between rival organizations that the issue may keep the legislature in an uproar.

Labor has an elaborate program to portions of which the state department of labor will accede. A plan will be encouraged to increase awards paid to injured workmen under the industrial insurance act.

The school fight over tax levies that was waged before the last session was broken out again at this session through the introduction of two rival bills. The hardest fight may come over the question of substituting county units for district units.

Farm interests have a larger membership than usual and attempts have been made to organize a farm bloc. The city of Tacoma threatens to inject a fight over the extension of powers of publicly owned utilities. Club women of the state will send a lobby to Olympia to insist upon a new program in which the establishment of a women's industrial home and clinic will be the most important issue.

Efforts may be made to amend the administrative code passed two years ago to abolish superfluous and overlapping boards and departments. There is a great deal of doubt as to how the code has worked and threats have been made to demand an accounting. As a rule, state officials will have few new bills to present to the legislature.
