COYOTE BOUNTY ORDER PREPARED

Additional Bounty Plan
Is Placed Before the
County Court

FORM COYOTE CLUBS

Directed to Pay Bounty
to Club Members Upon
Certificate Signed by
Club Officers

Order providing for the pay-
ment of additional bounty on coyotes
has been prepared by District
Judge Neuner, and is being con-
sidered by the county court. The new
order will allow the county to pay \$10
each coyote scalp in addition to
sum paid jointly by the state and
city.

It is held that the coyotes are a men-
ace to the sheep industry of the coun-
ty and are not only destroying a profit-
able industry but are also cutting
into the taxable property of the state.
Consequently the court feels that
the method of payment of addi-
tional bounty is necessary but that a
certificate of skins is necessary
to prevent payment on coyotes
brought in from other coun-
ties.

The latest this year contains a levy
of \$100 for bounty payments to meet
the state of the \$3 and \$4
bounty by the state and coun-
ty and also the additional bounty paid
the county alone. The order, if
passed, will set aside \$2,000 from
sum to meet the state bounty and
\$100 to pay additional bounties.

It will also be provided that the
county clerk shall pay the additional bounty
when skins are presented within
10 days after the animal has been
killed. A certificate signed by the
owner or secretary of an organized
club is necessary or an affi-
davit, satisfactory to the county clerk,
must be signed. Forms of these cer-
tificates and affidavits are given in
order.

The county clerk is given the right
to require the bounty claimant to pro-
duce satisfactory evidence, other than
an affidavit, if desired to prove that
the animal was killed within the coun-
ty. This means that skins can-
not be taken to the county clerk
for his honesty and truthfulness.

In addition to the additional bounty
for the provisions made for fil-
ing certificates and affidavits, the
county clerk is also required by the state
and county to demand there is also
a bounty to be sent in by mail and that the
claimant must be accompanied by

witnesses who will testify that to their
personal knowledge the animal was
killed within the county. The order
will not in any way affect the bounty
payments on animals other than
coyotes.

Provision is also made that should
the state legislature repeal the bounty
agreement between the county and
state that the \$2,000 now provided for
state bounties shall go into the addi-
tional bounty fund.

PARDONS GIVEN TO 29 BY SEN. RITNER

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 15.—Twenty-
nine conditional and full pardons, ten
of which affected murderers serving
life terms in the state penitentiary,
were issued by Roy W. Ritner in the
30 days that he occupied the execu-
tive chair while Governor Olcott was
in the east. This was announced at
the governor's office here today.

In each instance the murderers pardoned
by Mr. Ritner obtained their release
contingent upon their promise to
remain clear of law violations. Three
of the men pardoned were Chinese
sent to the penitentiary to serve life
terms in connection with
tong murders.

Two of these, Tung Wong and Yee
Guck, were sentenced in Portland to
serve life terms in the year 1918, but
were confined in the Multnomah jail
until late in 1921, when they were
transferred to the penitentiary. Tung
Wong's pardon was opposed by both
the trial judge and the district attor-
ney.

The other Chinese pardoned by Mr.
Ritner was Chin Borkey, sentenced to
a life term for a murder committed in
La Grande in July, 1917. He served
as a trustee at the home of the parole
officer. Governor Olcott previously
had refused to pardon Borkey or re-
commend him for parole.

Other murderers pardoned by Ritner
included Jesse Webb, Fred Moorman,
Morrison Campbell, Steven Papovich,
M. Apichberry, Tommy Morris, Zina
Peters and F. Bidoff.

BRANDER DECLARED NOT KLANSMAN

TILLAMOOK, Jan. 15.—The hooded
men who overpowered Mrs. Nevada
Standish and branded her on the
breast with a white hot cross the
night of November 21, 1922, are not
members of the Ku Klux Klan, ac-
cording to Mrs. Standish herself. Mrs.
Standish knows who they are.

The scar, small and outlined by the
white of the healed skin is visible
save when Mrs. Standish wears a
high-necked dress.

"The Ku Klux Klan is not respon-
sible," Mrs. Standish has insisted in
an interview. "The men were hooded
and sheeted, but the disguise was a
makeshift affair."

Mrs. Standish herself is a member
of the Ladies of the Invisible Empire.
Her stepfather, Edward Wiles, Port-
land hotel proprietor, is a klansman.

Following the scene at her home
the night in November, Mrs. Standish
never appeared in public without a
revolver stuck in her belt.

Townfolk gave her credit for being
able to take care of herself while her
husband lay a-bed in a Portland hos-
pital.

Mrs. Standish claims she knows
nothing of the reasons for the mys-
terious attack. She knows who the
men are, but yet will not reveal their
names.
