That small town life has an appeal for people everywhere is proved by the many excellent motion pictures with such a background. The latest, and what is thought by New York critics to be one of the best, is "The Super-Sex," the attraction at the Liberty Theatre tonight and tomorrow.

EGGS YIELD GOOD RETURNS

WINLOCK, Wash., Jan. 13.—One hundred and forty-one carloads of eggs were shipped from here the past year. These eggs were worth to the poultrymen nearly \$700,000.

Sixty-three carloads were sent direct from here by freight to the New York City market and three others were sent to the same place by express during the war shortage. All of these eggs were extras and firsts and

bring the highest price on the New York market. Honolulu received five carloads besides regular weekly shipments of part car lots.

Adding to the income of the poultrymen, one firm paid out \$96,000 last year for culled hens, roosters, capons and broilers.
