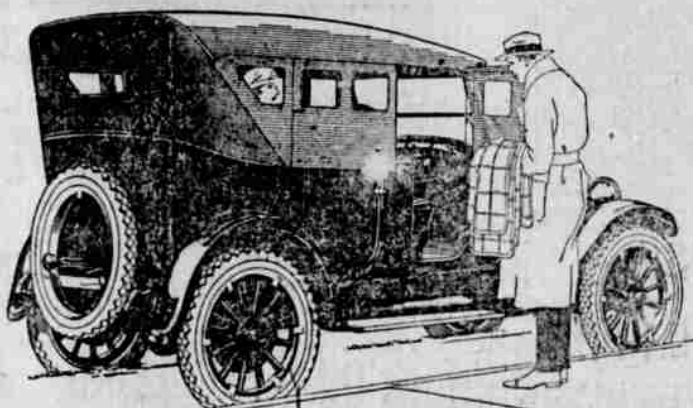

DODGE DEALER BACK FROM EASTERN TRIP

Visited New York and Detroit—Attended National Convention of Dodge Bros. dealers.

Interviewed this morning following his arrival home late last night from a visit to New York City, Detroit, St. Paul and other eastern cities, J. O. Newland gave a graphic picture of business conditions on the Atlantic coast and in the middle west. His stay in New York extended to almost three days, much of the short time in that city being devoted to attending the convention of Dodge Bros. district and local dealers from all over the United States. During his trip he became well acquainted with Mr. Haines, president of the Dodge Bros. company, and also with other executives of departments at Detroit, and from these officials obtained a great deal of first hand information concerning the car and its manufacture. It has always been the policy of Dodge Bros. to build a car that every dealer may stand behind. Mr. Newland alleged, and the company took great care to impress the truth of this attitude upon every man present. Beginning with the selection of the steel that goes into their cars, Dodge Bros. company buys only the best material that science and skilled workmen can produce, and manufacturers supplying this material have come to the point where they are eager to meet this demand. Mr. Newland stated.

Dealers in all parts of the United States are urged to cooperate with the company in all matters pertaining to distribution of Dodge Bros. cars, even to reporting any defects that may develop in a machine that has been purchased by a user. In this way the car has been brought up to its present perfection, and its dependability has become common knowledge throughout the country, he stated.

In order to transport the dealers who met in Detroit enroute to New York, special trains were chartered by Dodge Bros., and these palatial specials were given right of way over the tracks to the nation's metropolis, the run being made in record time, scarcely any stops being made. The whole business of operating trains throughout the east, Mr. Newland said, was based on efficiency, and every employee of the railways was courteous personified. Service to the public appeared to be their sole object, and the Roseburg man says they certainly were good. While in New York the dealers were quartered in one of the big hotels of the city, the entire upper floors of the hotel having been reserved by Dodge Bros. for that time. The hotel contains 2290 rooms and suits of rooms, and a good share of these apartments were occupied by Dodge Bros. dealers during the convention.

On the return trip Mr. Newland stopped at Detroit for a couple of days, during that time making inspection trips through the manufacturing plant where Dodge Bros. cars are made, and there he had opportunity of seeing for himself just how much work is required to produce a completed car. While the capacity of the plant is approximately 800 automobiles every day, dealers were fairly scrambling for the output and in many cases unable to get sufficient machines to fill their waiting list. With their system of distribution Dodge Bros. Co. endeavors to place the cars fairly and impartially, and every district distributor gets his quota regularly.

Business throughout the East is excellent, Mr. Newland asserted, and optimism for the future is apparent everywhere he went.

CAR STUCK IN MUD ALL NIGHT

That the Roseburg-Myrtle Point highway is in an almost impassable condition, owing to recent rains, was stated this morning by H. J. Baker, who with his daughter, Miss Doris Baker, and accompanying Mr. Z. Geisel in a Hudson car were stalled all night in the mud at the foot of the hill, about 18 or 20 miles southwest of Roseburg. The party were enroute from Bandon to Salem. Until a few days ago Mr. Baker and family resided on Mill St., this city. Mrs. Baker and two daughters going to Salem early last week, while Mr. Baker and Miss Doris went to Bandon to look after property interests. Arriving at the foot of the hill on this side of the mountains last evening, a short time before dark, the car foundered in the soft roadway, and in spite of the graveled surface, sunk in to the axle. Efforts to get the machine out were unavailing, and after darkness came on the party composed themselves for an all night's stay in the car, as there are no farm houses near.

Early this morning a truck came along and after jacking up the rear of the marooned car it was pulled out of the mud.

It was stated that owing to the bad conditions of this section of the road the highway engineer contemplates closing it to travel. There are yet some ungraveled sections, and the grade being now it cuts up badly, making the going hazardous.

Y AGENTS WILL SPEAK TO OFFICERS

ALEM, Ore., Jan. 17.—Federal Education Commissioner R. A. Haynes, who is making a personal tour of the Pacific Coast states, arrived here yesterday and will address law enforcement convention at place Thursday evening.

Commissioner Haynes will be in city Friday and will address joint session of the legislature. Haynes will speak on the general subject of law enforcement, outlining his program for the present which includes a plan of close cooperation among federal and state authorities. The Commissioner believes that the one thing most needed at this time is that the cities responsible for the enforcement of law be courageous, patriotic and of law and order, and of American fundamentals.

The visit of Commissioner Haynes and his corps of advisors has various objects, principally to confer with enforcement officials generally to develop an increased spirit of cooperation from authorities of character particularly those used by the concurrent section of the Eighteenth Amendment. Vast meetings have been planned in San Francisco, Los Angeles, El Paso and other cities where Commissioner Haynes will discuss the vital importance of the public supporting law observance and the progress which has been made in enforcement.

Col. L. G. Nutt, Chief of the National forces of the United States, is accompanying Commissioner Haynes, will make a survey of

narcotic conditions along Pacific Coast and Mexican Border, giving special attention to the smuggling of drugs.
