BRYAN'S OPINION ON LIQUOR QUESTION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—Liquor drinking prohibition agents, a "wet" press and the failure of the government to deal effectively with rum runners are the principal scars in the history of national prohibition, which is celebrating its third birthday today, in the opinion of William Jennings Bryan.

Bryan says America should notify all nations that allow their flags to be used as rum runners, that if they cannot prevent their flags flying over floating bars, America will. The government should take over all whiskey on hand, thus eliminating private interests, he says, and enforcement should be trusted only to those favoring prohibition.
